To Hold Clinic

Dr. Frederick Seibner, health officer, will conduct his second immunization clinic for the second injection of triple vaccine on diphtheria-tetanus toxoid, May 29 from 2-3 p. m. at Norfolk School.

Parents are reminded that this second injection should be given four weeks after the first injection with the third injection six months later. Booster doses and smallpox will also be given at the clinic. Children who were vaccinated for the first time for smallpox at the May 1 clinic should return to this clinic only if the vaccination did not react. Smallpox vaccination should be repeated every seven years to maintain immunity.

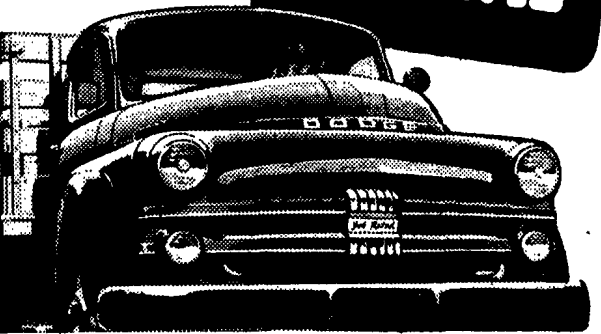
