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Air Force to Send Planes to Massena

Massena—United States Air Force has agreed to send two planes to Massena for the sesquicentennial observance here June 26-28.

They will be a F-86 Sabre jet fighter and a B-50 medium bomber. Both will be on display at Alcoa Field.

Motor transportation will bring the exhibits to the North Country from Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio.

Ramps on both sides of the Sabre permit spectators to get a birds-eye view of the aircraft's mechanisms. At present the F-86 is carrying the brunt of the air attack to the Russian-built MIGs, over Korea.

The B-50 bomber is one of the nation's largest conventional type aircraft, capable of high altitude instrument flying. "Lucky Lady II" was in the nation's headlines only recently when it made a non-stop flight around the world. It is the only aircraft to hold this distinction.

Both displays are actual planes cut away to give viewers an overall picture of the inside parts that operate the craft.

M/Sgt. George A. Kiel of the United States Army and Air Force Recruiting office in Ogdensburg is in charge of arrangements to bring the planes here.

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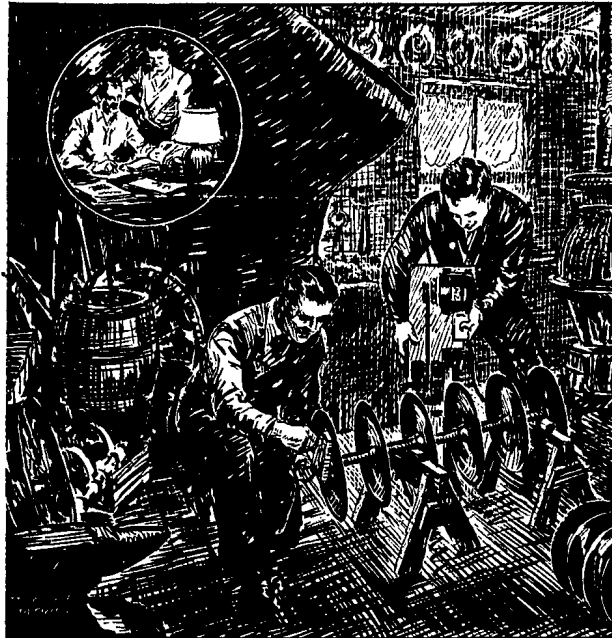

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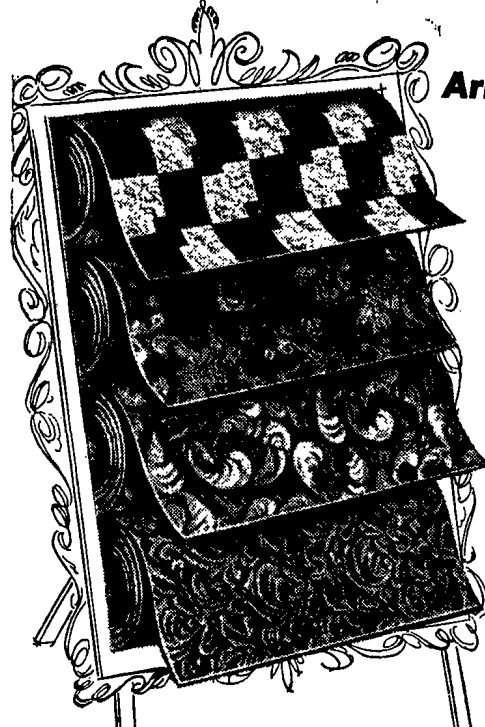
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
