## Son of West Potsdam Couple To Speak at Alcoa in Massena

Dr. Earl G. Planty, executive counselor of Johnson and Johnson, world's largest surgical dressing manufacturer in New Brunswick, N. J., will address the management group of the Aluminum Company of America, Massena, on Monday, June 9.

Dr. Planty is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Planty of West Potsdam. He will speak on "Training and Its Value in Managing Modern Man."

Dr. Planty, who is a former employee of Alcoa's wire mill plant, was born in Dickinson Center, and educated in the Massena elementary and high schools. He later taught at the Crofts Island elementary school.

After graduating from St. Lawrence University he attended Cornell University, where he obtained his Ph. D. degree. Recently he attended the Harvard Advanced Management School for business administrators.

A recognized specialist in personnel, human relations, and the selection and development of business administrators, Dr. Planty assumed his present position in 1947 after starting with Johnson and Johnson as training director in 1943. He is the coauthor of "Training Employees and Managers", a contributor to the "Personnel Handbook", and advisory editor of the "Foreman's Digest."

Prior to his present position and after leaving Massena, Dr. Planty worked for the General Electric Company in Schenectady. He is also a former head of the department of education and psychology of Union College in Barboursville, Ky. During the war he was training director for the Air Forces Depot at Rome.

Dr. Planty is now in charge of executive selection, development, transfers, and promotions for Johnson and Johnson in the company's main plant in New Brunswick, N. J.

He is chairman of the International Management Committee for the selection and development of business executives and serves on the executive development committee of the American Management Association and the Industrial Conference Board.

He married the former Miss Marjorie Shaver of Ilin, who taught home economics at Potsdam High School. The Plantys and their two daughters, Mary, 10, and Jean, 9, live at 114 South First St. in Highland Park, N. J.

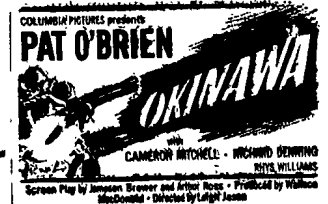
