Perry, in Relief, Stops Watertown In 8-6 Contest

Leon Perry, pitching relief ball after he came on in the fifth inning with no outs and two on, overcame a two-run deficit to hurl Potsdam High School to a win over Watertown High, 8 to 6 Tuesday afternoon on the Leroy St. diamond.

Perry finished the fifth by putting the visitors in the exhibition game down one, two, three. He went on to pitch two more innings of hitless, ransless ball.

Dale Sherburne started for the locals and allowed all the visitor's runs on five hits. Pierce was on the hill for Watertown and allowed nine Potsdam hits.

Watertown drew first blood in the first inning when Peck walked and then scored on an error by Potsdam backstop Paul Murphy. But Potsdam bounced right back in their half of the frame to score two runs when Murphy and Al Reasoner scored through a brace of misplays and a single by Obie Bancroft.

Ogdensburg — An error in the bottom of the tenth with two men out and a man on second, enabled St. Mary's Academy to down Potsdam in a thrilling battle at Winter Park by a score of 3-2 Friday. It was a regularly scheduled Northern League game and SMA's sixth win.

Two lefthanders, Tom Murray of SMA and Leon Perry of the Potsdam team, staged a thriller all the way and it proved to be the SMA hurler's hit in the 10th to second base which meant the winning marker.

Before a crowd of returning alumni and graduates, Clarkson College lost the first in a home-and-home series at Snell Field Saturday, 8-3, to archrival St. Lawrence University.

Errors spelled the difference for Hank Hodges' Golden Knights. Chet Vincent started on the hill for the Larries. He was replaced by Ralph Glover in the fifth. Clarkson garnered six hits in nine innings.

Stan Mroczkowski, who started for the Engineers, got the loss. Don Smith came on the mound in the fourth and Bill Chamberlain started pitching in the final inning.

The Larries got 12 hits for the afternoon. The Larries opened the scoring in the third when with two men down, third sacker Bart Reissig walked, went to second on a passed ball and scored on a single by Dick Robinson.

Clarkson went into the lead for the only time in the bottom of the third when they scored twice. Larry Rupprecht led off with a walk. Vincent made a play to second on Norb Schulenberg's bunt but Rupprecht beat the throw. Stan Moore beat out a bunt to load the bases with none out. Vincent got Palozzi on three strikes. In appreciation of Mr. Williams' enduring interest and unselfish contributions to Clarkson College and its alumni association, George E. Peck, president of the Clarkson Tech Alumni Association, presented him with a desk pen inscribed from the alumni association.

A native of Watertown, Mr. Williams was graduated from Watertown High School in 1919 and was employed by the New York Power Corporation in that city from June 1924 to August 1925. He received his bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering from Clarkson in 1923 and the bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering from the same college in 1924.

Mr. Williams prides himself in having attended every Clarkson College commencement since he graduated. He did so even during the years when there were three held a year.

Active in the Schenectady section of the alumni association, Mr. Williams has served in all offices of that group. At present he is a director and thus a member of the
