

Pupils of 1st Grade Tour Dean Farm as School Work Project

North Stockholm—Twenty-four pupils of the first grade of the Norwood section of Norwood-Norfolk Central School were guests last Monday at a farm party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Dean at North Stockholm.

Lawrence Dean Jr. is a member of the first grade class. The farm party was held in connection with farm project work they are now studying. This class also made a recent tour of the Norwood Fire Station, the Norwood A & P store, the telephone office, postoffice and depot.

The class arrived at the Dean farm in the large school bus with Sealy Buck as bus driver. Mrs. Betty Smith, their teacher, and Miss Gardner, a cadet teacher, accompanied the class.

Mr. and Mrs. Dean were both on hand to greet the pupils. The tour began in the barn, where the pupils petted the Holstein and Jersey calves. They also saw the stanchions in which the cows are put at milking time.

As the group was leaving this barn, Mr. Dean called their attention to a baby pig in a pen. Mr. Dean had a dish of warm milk that he poured into the pig's trough, and the small pig climbed right into the dish of milk.

The mother pig, which the Deans call Porky, presented the Deans with 14 baby pigs recently, but unfortunately there was not enough food for all 14 babies, so the Deans had to teach this baby to drink from a dish. Artificial light had to be placed in its pen for heat.

Outside the barn, in a henhouse, the class saw 75 chickens and a nest of duck eggs.

In a pen surrounded with high wire was a chestnut pony, all saddled and ready for riding. This pony, whose name is "Bingo," wore streamers of red and blue in his saddle and bridle. Mr. Dean gave each child a ride on the pony.

The climax of the excursion came when Mrs. Dean, assisted by Mrs. Robert Gage, gave each child an ice cream cone. Five of the children sacrificed their cones, and gave them to "Bingo," who enjoys ice cream just as much as a child does.

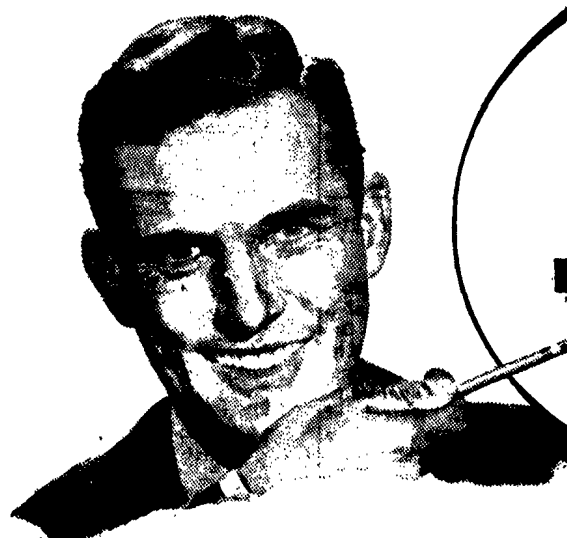

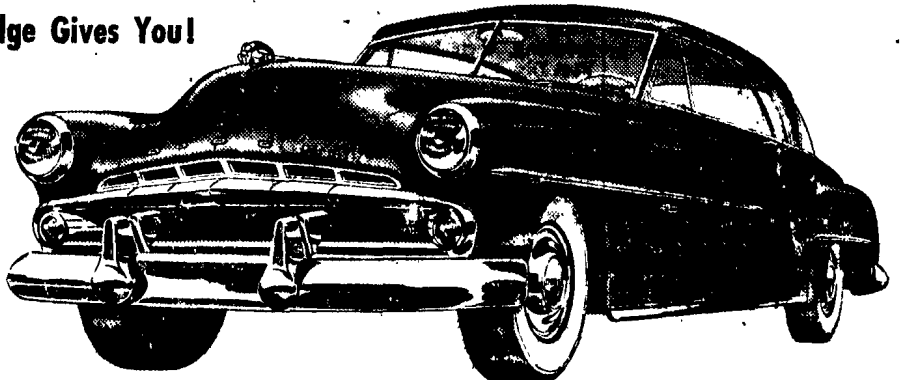
