### Visitors Attend Sesquicentennial In Hopkinton

Hopkinton — Over 800 persons, including more than 50 representatives of the Vermont Historical Society, attended the all-day celebration of the Hopkinton sesquicentennial held Saturday in this village. Many of the Vermont visitors were residents of Vergennes, the village from which the original founders of Hopkinton emigrated 150 years ago.

The program included a tour of several old homes and other places of historical interest in the village during the morning, and a tour of the town of Hopkinton in the afternoon, including a visit to Lake Ozonia.

Collections of antiques and historical relics were on display in the Town Hall and church in the village. A dinner for those attending the meeting was served at noon in the Town Hall.

The day was climaxed by a series of talks in the evening, including speeches by Dr. Albert B. Corey, New York state historian, and Dr. Arthur W. Peach, director of the Vermont State Historical Society. Other speakers included Watson B. Berry, well-known North Country historian, and Allen Beach of Vergennes, Vt.

A musical program and several tableaux, skits and pantomimes were also presented during the evening session held in the Town Hall.

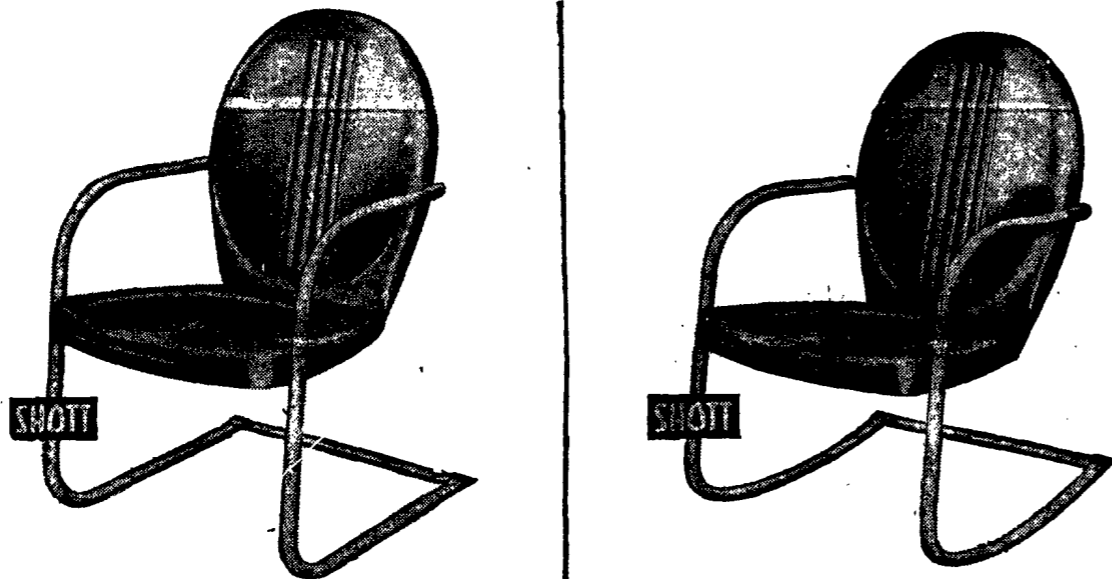

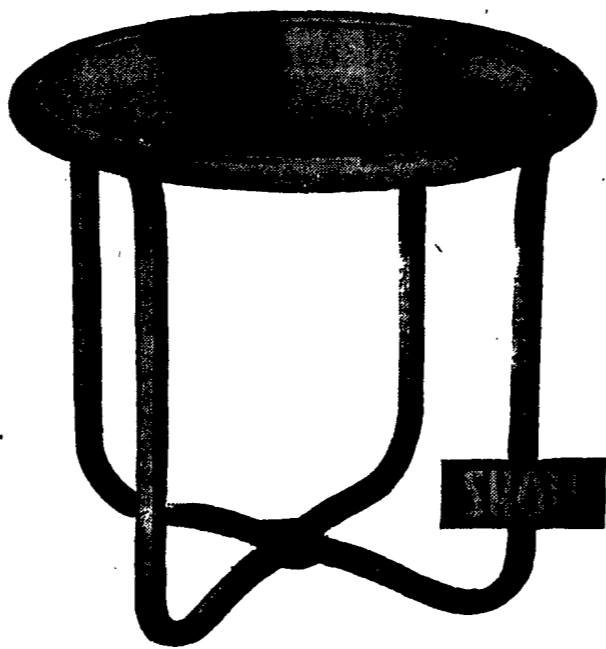

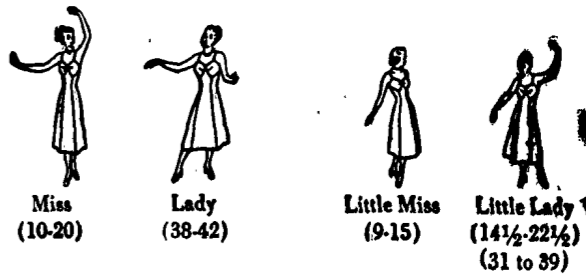
