

Marion Cary Receives Honor In Parishville Graduating Class

Parishville — Commencement honors for the 1952 graduating class of Parishville-Hopkinton Central School, based upon three and one-half years' work, have been announced by officials of the school.

Marion Cary, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leland Cary, Parishville, is valedictorian of the class with an average of 91.87. Miss Cary has been a leading student during her high school days; and has taken an active part in many of the school activities.

She has been a member of the senior band and the senior chorus for four years, and has served as class reporter this year. An active member of the Newspaper Club, Miss Cary served as assistant editor, head typist, and editorial editor. This present year she is president of the Library club, historian of Future Homemakers of America, and editor of the 1952 "Panorama," school yearbook.

An active class worker, Miss Cary has participated in all of the class projects. She had a leading role in the senior class play. Her out-of-school activities have been varied, including singing in the Union Church choir, baby-sitting and running a Popular Club Plan. Miss Cary has taken the commercial course and the vocational homemaking course. Her plans for after graduation are not complete, but she plans to take an office position if she does not attend a business school.

Salutatorian honors for the class go to M. Phillip Snell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton B. Snell, RD 4, with an average of 87.35 percent. He, too, has participated in school activities. He has been a member of the football squads, both touch and tackle; basketball manager, and on the baseball squad. He has been active in the local and county Future Farmers of America. He has been a contributing member of the Newspaper Club, and worked with advertising and photography for the "Panorama." President of his class, Snell participated in the various activities, including the senior play.

He is a 4-H club member, a regular communicant at St. Mary's Church, and serves as treasurer of the Young Co-ops. Taking the vocational agriculture course, he has found plenty of opportunity for practical experience on his parents' large farm. Snell plans to enter Canton Agricultural and Technical Institute in September.

Following the banquet, served by the women of Zion Episcopal Church Guild, a musical program was given.

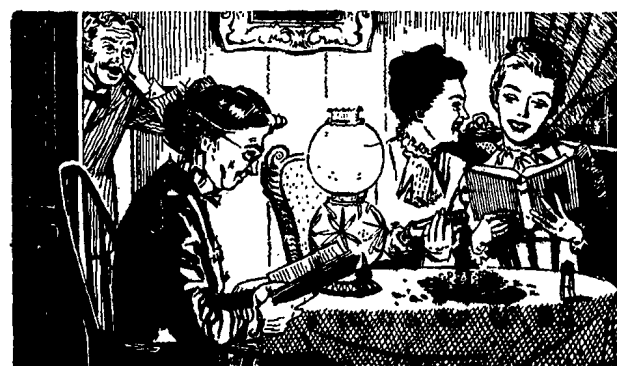
Miss Marion Thomas, kindergarten teacher in the Colton school, is now the owner of a new car.

After years of study by the government death records kept by another American prisoner of the Japanese, Sergeant Heaton's body was found in a common grave with the remains of eight other men. The Japanese kept no records of deaths and burials at the camp. The record kept by the American prisoner listed death in chronological order based on information he could pick up.
