

### Archie Tower, 77, Dies Near Buckton

Archie Tower, 77, died Tuesday, June 17, at his farm home near Buckton. He had been in failing health since January of this year.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon, June 18, at 2 p. m. at Buckton Methodist Church with the Rev. Frank E. Morey, Brushers Falls, officiating. Burial will be in Buckton Union Cemetery.

Mr. Tower was born in Dickinson Center Aug. 19, 1874, a son of Almon and Emily Haskell Tower. He spent his life in that section as a farmer.

He married Miss Myrtle Morey in Nicholsonville on Sept. 1, 1900.

Surviving are his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Clara Hanson, of Winthrop, and Mrs. Dominic (Nora) Lucente of Port Chester; two sons, DeForest Tower of Potsdam and Maj. Archie Tower of Silver City, N. M.; nine grandchildren, 10 great grandchildren, one brother, Herman Tower of Jersey City, N. J., and one sister, Mrs. Bert (Mamie) Bellows of Dickinson Center.

### 2 Couples Chosen To Teach in Summer Workshop at PSTC

Potsdam State Teachers College's Workshop in the Arts this summer will have two husband and wife combinations on its faculty, according to Miss Helen Hansen, director of the workshop, who announced this week names of some of the faculty members for the summer courses.

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lloyd and Mr. and Mrs. Stanley J. Kunitz will be on the faculty for the program which begins in Potsdam July 7 and will wind up Aug. 15. Mr. Lloyd, former director of education at the Julliard School of Music and now a member of the literature and music faculty of Julliard, will direct the two music groups of the workshop.

Is Composer  
Mr. Lloyd is well-known as a composer and pianist and has taught at the Bennington summer session school of the dance as well as at the famous Connecticut College Summer Dance School at New London, Conn.

He has composed on commission for Jose Limon, Martha Graham, has done the music for a number of documentary films, and has published "The Fireside Book of Folk Songs."

The music workshop will be offered in two sections for the non-musician and for the music specialist. Through a creative approach students will be given an opportunity to compose and develop further sensitivity to the art and to perform in the field of their choice.

The workshop will also have the services of Mr. Lloyd's wife, Ruth, who during the academic year, is accompanist for Miss Bessie Schenberger, also a member of the workshop faculty, in her dance courses at Sarah Lawrence College.

Mr. Kunitz will lead the seminar discussions and the creative writing group while Mrs. Kunitz will direct the theatre arts group.

Was On Faculty  
Mr. Kunitz was formerly a member of the college faculty before joining the New School in September, 1950. He has taught at the previous summer workshops both at White Pine Camp and at Potsdam. The editor of several biographical dictionaries including "Living Authors," "Authors Today and Yesterday," and "Twentieth Century Authors." Mr. Kunitz has published poetry in anthologies. He received his bachelors and masters degrees from Harvard University and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

Mrs. Kunitz received her bachelors degree from the University of California at Berkeley and is also a former member of the faculty at Potsdam. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and has had professional theatre experience as an actress and in writing drama.

### Ellen Anderson, Retiring from Faculty, To Direct 2-Week PSTC July Workshop

Miss Ellen R. Anderson, assistant professor of education at Potsdam State Teachers College who is retiring this summer, will direct the first in a series of two-week workshops July 7 through July 18. It was announced this week by Dr. O. Ward Satterlee, director of the elementary education department at the college.

Miss Anderson will conduct a short intensive study of arithmetic in response to requests from many teachers in the field.

The two-week workshop series will also include courses in music and remedial reading techniques, the details of which will be announced later.

#### Allows Projects

The program will provide an opportunity to work out individual projects as well as group activities. Students will spend the entire morning in class while the afternoon will be devoted to seminar discussions or other classes according to their desire.

Each workshop is offered for two credits toward a graduate or undergraduate degree and the student may select one or more in addition to attending regular summer school classes.

In commenting upon the arithmetic workshop Miss Anderson said that the emphasis will be placed on the meaning and understanding of arithmetic and how children learn. It will include the study of arithmetic experiences in the home, community, and school as a basis for learning. The importance of sequential learning in the various arithmetical categories will be stressed. Miss Anderson will also examine new textbooks in arithmetic and discuss their adaptability with the students.

#### Retirement Announced

The retirement of Miss Anderson which was announced at the commencement exercises by Dr. Frederick W. Crumb, president of the college, will mark the end of 27 years of service to elementary education at Potsdam. Since arriving here in 1925 as principal of the elementary grades, Miss Anderson has worked in nearly every capacity in the education department. She was acting director of training for the late Dr. Otto Voelker and off-campus supervisor for cadet teachers.

Recently members of the educational department faculty honored Miss Anderson with a surprise banquet at the Hotel "R" in Canton attended by approximately 50 persons. At the commencement exercises Dr. Crumb deputized her to award the diplomas to the graduates as a tribute to the loyalty she has given the college.

Born in Sweden  
Born in Sweden in Bourp, Miss Anderson came to the United States with her parents and three brothers and sisters at the age of four. The family settled in Connecticut where Miss Anderson received her early education until moving to New York State.

She graduated from the old Cortland State Normal School and took her first job teaching 65 children in the first and second grades at Luzerne for the sum of \$450 a year. Later Miss Anderson taught 84 first graders for \$500 a year at Cobleskill.

Becoming an authority on elementary education and receiving the degrees of bachelor of science and master of arts from New York University, Miss Anderson moved to Princeton, N.J. where she taught and was principal of the elementary grades before coming to Potsdam.

During her sabbaticals at the college, Miss Anderson has traveled extensively in Scandinavia and in the eastern United States. Miss Anderson, after completing the workshop this summer, expects to travel in the south and the west for the next two years.

### Sverdlow Asks \$505,000 from Container Firm

A Potsdam businessman is bringing action for more than a half a million dollars against a corporation and its attorney, charging malicious prosecution and false arrest.

Max Sverdlow of Potsdam, senior member of the firm of M. Sverdlow and Sons, seeks \$505,000 from the Reading Corrugated Container Corporation and the company's attorney, Henry H. Salzberg of New York. On the basis of a complaint made by the corporation in 1950, Mr. Sverdlow was indicted for grand larceny by a grand jury. The indictment was dismissed in county court last year.

The corporation had charged that Mr. Sverdlow defrauded the Reading, Pa. corporation of \$10,000 from Oct. 27, 1944 to June 5, 1947 by falsifying weight slips on scrap paper he sold them.

In his complaint against the corporation Mr. Sverdlow alleges that before the malicious prosecution, officers attempted to extort money from him. When he refused to pay, he charges, they induced witnesses to give perjured testimony before the grand jury which brought the indictment against him.

The case will probably come before the Supreme Court in St. Lawrence County in September. Mr. Sverdlow is represented by Charles D. Campbell, Potsdam attorney who also fought the grand larceny indictment.
