County Captured June Milk Lead

St. Lawrence County captured the milkshed's production leadership in June from Oneida County which had been on top nine consecutive months. Oneida dropped to second place for the first time since August, 1960, which was also the last time St. Lawrence was in the number one spot.

St. Lawrence's rise to the top was brought about by an increase in its receipts of 2.8 million pounds coupled with a decrease of 1.7 million pounds in Oneida's receipts. Deliveries by St. Lawrence dairy farmers rose from 54.8 million pounds in May to 57.6 million pounds in June. Oneida receipts fell from 58.3 million pounds to 56.6 million pounds.

Only Bradford County, Pa., in third place, Delaware County in fifth place and Otsego County in eighth place retained their May positions in June. There was one new name on the list. Jefferson County jumped from seventh to fourth place and Lewis County climbed from tenth to ninth, while Chenango County dropped from fourth to sixth and Cortland County slipped from sixth to seventh.

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N Y State Commerce Department Backs 'Burg In Airlines Dispute

Ogdensburg — This city has a new and mighty ally in its fight to retain air service — the State of New York.

On Oct. 30 the eminent Washington law firm of Arnold, Forstas and Porter filed a petition in the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit on behalf of the City of Ogdensburg, the Ogdensburg Chamber of Commerce, the Ogdensburg Bridge & Port Authority against the Civil Aeronautics Board.

Edmund L. Shea, counsel of the Ogdensburg Bridge & Port Authority was advised Saturday that the Department of Commerce of the State of New York will join in this petition to ask the court to order a full hearing by the CAB in the Mohawk Airlines case as it affects service to Ogdensburg.

Mohawk Still Flying Here
The joint action taken by the "Save Our Air Service Committee" representing all West St. Lawrence County, the City of Ogdensburg under the leadership of Mayor Francis B. Burns, the Bridge & Port Authority, the Chamber of Commerce has kept the Mohawk planes flying in and out of Ogdensburg since Nov. 1.

Mohawk had filed a notice with the CAB that it was ending all service to Ogdensburg on that date. The Ogdensburg groups filed an objection to this cancellation and on Nov. 1 as the last plane was leaving, the CAB issued an order to Mohawk to keep service in Ogdensburg "indefinitely." Mohawk promptly filed a petition asking for a suspension of this order and the CAB has not acted on it as yet.

Clinics Set At Norwood

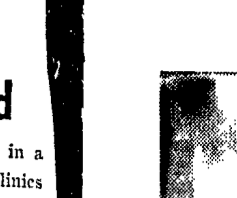
