Nov. 10, 1960

The Republicans swept the elections in the town of Potsdam, from the Presidential and Vice - Presidential Candidates on down, including big margins for local candidates, Assemblyman Verner Ingram and William Cubley, who was running for Special Surrogate.

Senator John F. Kennedy (Democrat), Mass., became the first Roman Catholic to be elected President of the United States, when both the State of California and of Minnesota slipped into his column, shortly after noon Wednesday.

St. Lawrence County stayed safely in the Republican column in the presidential election yesterday, but Senator John F. Kennedy, the winning Democratic candidate, cut deep into the county's traditional GOP plurality.
