Methodist Youth Group Sponsors Vocational Institute In Malone

Norwood—The Methodist Youth Fellowship of St. Lawrence District, Northern New York Conference of the Methodist Church, will hold a Vocations Institute in Malone, on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 17 and 18, using the theme, "Christ Above All."

The Institute is open to those in grades 9 through 12 and graduates, and reservations should be sent to the Malone Church by November 10. The total cost will be \$2.50 per person, of which \$1.25 must accompany the reservation.

Friday, Nov. 17 at 4:30 p. m. and will continue until 6 p. m. when the banquet is scheduled to start. At this time, the Rev. Leonard Owens will address the group and there will also be a panel of college representatives.

Twelve colleges have been invited to participate in this panel, and, so far, acceptance has come from the following: Ohio Northern; Hartwick, N. Y. Drew, N. J.; Greenboro, No. Car.; National College, Kan.; Scarritt, Tenn. Others are expected to reply.

Later in the evening, there will be group meetings with college representatives, individual conferences with college personnel, recreation, and group worship.

Saturday's sessions will start at 8 a. m., with a Dramatic Worship service by the Malone Sub-District. This will include "God's Thombones" with interpretive dance; also portions of Haydon's "Creation". Group conferences at 9:00 will be followed by a filmstrip "Careers That Matter", and introductions of Vocations Leaders.

From 10 a. m. until 12 Noon, there will be meetings in Vocations Groups. These have been listed as follows: Group 1—Church Music; Group 11—Christian Education; Group 111—The Ministry. Under Group 111 are 4 sub-groups: (A) Armed Forces Chaplain; (B) Hospital Chaplain; (C) College Minister; and (D) Pastoral Minister; Group 1V—Other Church Related Fields, with several sub-groups: 1, Agricultural; 2, Business Administration; 3, Children's Work; 4, Deaconess 5, Engineering; 6, Home Economics; 7, Journalism; 8, Medicine; 9, Missionary; 10, Nursing; 11, Social Work; 12, Secretarial and Clerical.

After lunch, the group will be treated to another filmstrip "Make All Things New" with a "Question and Answer" period following. Miss Jeannette Goedeke, the Northern New York Conference's Rural Worker in the Adirondack area, will be in charge.
