Milan Wright Surprise Victor In Hopkinton

Hopkinton — A major political upset hit this township 4 Tuesday when voters elected independent candidate for Councilman, Milan Wright, over the Republican Town Councilman candidate, Lyle Greene, by a vote of 208 to 161.

Wright was the only independent candidate to be elected. The Independent party was composed of Republicans defeated during the primary election.

In other offices Clark S. Chittenden was elected Supervisor on the Republican ticket over Independent Daniel Wright with a vote of 286 to 82. In the Superintendent of Highways contest, GOP man Sidney Conklin Jr. was elected over Independent George Woodward by a vote of 212 to 162.

Merchant Phelps was elected GOP Justice of the Peace over Francis Bonno on the Independent ticket in a 216 to 147 vote.

All other offices were filled with Republican candidates who ran unopposed. They are: Town Clerk, Eileen Costa, 315; Tax Collector, Gordon Daby, 307; Assessor four years, Guy Snell, 300; and Assessor two years, Clyde Hooper, 285.

In the District Attorney race, Charles Bowers swept Hopkinton by a vote of 232 to 87 for Francis LaVigne, Democrat. Corbett ran unopposed on the Republican ticket and Dr. J. Benton Pike took 242 votes with Dr. Alexander E. Dodds receiving 237.

The Town Hall issue in Hopkinton was passed by a vote of 153 yes and 99 no. The issue involved the appropriation of approximately \$25,000 for repairs to the Town Hall.

Bennett Wins By Huge Vote; GOP Victorious

Canton — incumbent Republican Town Supervisor Harley Bennett won another term here Tuesday as voters gave him an overwhelming vote of confidence. He beat Democrat James Carvell by 1640 to 408 votes.

Democrat Francis LaVigne surprised veteran observers here with a strong showing against District Attorney Charles E. Bowers in his home town. Bowers received 1525 to LaVigne's 605 votes for the DA post.

In general, the GOP gathered a 2-to-1 victory over the Democrats in all races; 52 percent of the eligible voters were at the polls.

In other Town of Canton races, Harry Norton beat Clarence T. Murphy for the Town Council, 1656 to 462; Mrs. Marion Howe was unopposed as Clerk; John Oliver III was elected Justice of the Peace over Thomas O'Neill by 1658 to 441 votes; Phillip L. Rexford was elected Highway Superintendent by 1649 to 452 votes over William Devine.

Winning GOP Assessors were John Fitzgerald (4 years) and John Wolfe Jr., Republican. Incumbent Justice of the Peace John Leecox, running on an independent ticket was also placed back in office when he defeated Chet Hosmer and Frank Sabad, Democrat and Republican respectively.

Leecox posted 508 votes to Sabad's 361 and Hosmer's 372. Sabad was the only Independent candidate in Norfolk.

Robert Eusto, Superintendent of Highways; and Mary Hagggett, Town Clerk, ran unopposed in the elections.

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Gwynn, Sullivan, Tie In Race For Assessor Of Colton Town

Colton — Republicans George Swift (Supervisor), Margaret Decker (Clerk) and Harold Regan (Highways Superintendent) were elected unopposed Tuesday by Town of Colton voters. Swift gathered 283, Decker 265, and Regan 255 votes.

The most unusual development was a tie between Republican Charles Gwynn Democrat Daniel Sullivan for Assessor (2 years). Each won 230 votes.

Republican Town Council candidate Thomas E. Frank was victorious over Democrat Francis O'Gorman by a close vote of 255-221.

In the Justice of the Peace race, GOP candidate Floyd M. Enslow was the winner by 261-224 over Democrat George Campbell. George Wright (E) won the assessor (4 year) post with a 277-195 vote over Democrat Hamilton Frary.

About 70 percent of the voters turned out at the polls. Incumbent DA Charles Bowers carried the township by 315 to 168 over Democrat Francis LaVigne.

In the Assessor two years contest, John Martin, Democrat, defeated Lerna McGee, Republican, by a vote of 693 to 469.

Charles Brower, Republican, was elected over John Hagen, Democrat, for Councilman by a vote of 611 to 565.

Charles Bowers posted 400 votes while Francis LaVigne won 625 votes in the District Attorney race for the township. Library trustees elected were Margaret Butler, 6 years; Robert Wagner, four years; and Bertrice Keyes, two years.

No decision has been made on a new election for the assessor post which was tied. In that contest, Gwynn scored 135 votes in Colton and 95 in South Colton, while Sullivan won 122 votes in Colton and 108 votes in South Colton.

Total registration was 458 Republicans, 167 Democrats, and five Liberals, for a 630 total. A total of 400 voted.

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1 teaspoon baking soda
