Seaway Heads For Best Year

Washington — (AP) — The St. Lawrence Seaway is heading toward its best year in history but is still falling far short of the rosy traffic predictions of its officials.

And the broadening gap between predictions and performance could result in an outcry for increased tolls for ships plying between Montreal and Great Lakes ports.

Before the 27-foot Great Lakes-to-the-Atlantic channel opened in 1959, Seaway officials worked out a set of tonnage estimates for the first 50 years of operation. The estimates are important because tolls are based on them.

But during the first two years of operation, cargo shipped through the Seaway was substantially below expectations. So were the tolls collected.

From April 15, when the Seaway opened this year, through September the tonnage has been running at a rate of about 3 million tons monthly, compared with the original estimate of over 4 million tons.

Democrats Ask Prendergast's Resignation

The local town Democratic committee last week called for the ouster of State Democratic Chairman Michael H. Prendergast.

Prendergast endorsed Lawrence Gerosa, an independent candidate for mayor of New York city, in preference to Robert Wagner, the Democratic incumbent.

Voicing their disapproval by means of a telegram to Prendergast, the committee also notified Mayor Wagner. St. Lawrence County Democratic Chairman John D. Van Kernen, and National Democratic Committee Chairman John Bailey of their action.

The text of the telegram follows:

"The Town of Potsdam Democratic Committee, in view of your announced support for the independent candidate for mayor of New York city and your opposition to the election of the Democratic Candidate Robert Wagner, hereby notifies you of our resolution requesting your immediate resignation as Democratic state chairman."

Teachers Observe Language Training At Campus School

Teachers from Carthage, Copenhagen and Lowville Central schools made a field trip to the State University College at Potsdam Monday.

The teachers, who are enrolled in an extension class, "Teaching French in the Elementary School," taught by Dr. Charles W. Snyder, professor of foreign language at the college, observed language classes at the college's Congdon Campus School taught by Professors Jordan Morrison and Nancy Schneider, and Rosemary Ventimiglia, a student.

Prof. Morrison, who is in charge of the Campus School foreign language program, conducted a seminar for teachers Monday morning. Later the educators observed instruction in the college's new language laboratory.

Chamber Approves Decoration Money; Sign Repairs Set

The Potsdam Chamber of Commerce, at a special meeting Monday morning, voted to donate \$200 to the Village of Potsdam for the Christmas decoration program.

The Chamber designated that \$125 be spent to extend the decorations further north on Market street, and that \$75 be spent for replacement of decorative candles.
