Madrid — The Madrid-Waddington football forces got a pleasant surprise last weekend. They defeated rival Parishville-Hopkinton 18-6, and then found out after the game that Lisbon had upset league-leading Clifton-Fine so that the M-W grid-ders were named co-champions of the Valley League along with Clifton Fine.

Madrid ended the season with identical 5-1 marks and part being a 27-20 defeat at the hands of Clifton. Up to last Saturday, the Star Lake crew had been undefeated and was on top of the league with Madrid second. The Clifton loss Saturday gave both squads identical 5-1 marks and part interest in the league crown.

The Madrid gridders defeated Parishville in a well-played game last Saturday morning on the Madrid field. All three Madrid touchdowns were scored by senior Neil Planty, as he tallied in the second, third, and fourth quarters. Parishville drew first blood with a tally in the opening stanza to take a 6-0 lead. However, M-W came back quickly, stiffened their defenses, and went on to overcome their neighbors.

Planty's first score came on a 12-yard buck through the line in the second period. This came after Parishville had scored at about the six minute mark of the first period. In that second frame, Parishville took over on downs at midfield and marched down the field for the score.

At the start of the third quarter, Parishville ran the kickoff back to the 30, hauled for two plays, and scored at most from midfield on Planty's run. Almost the same took place in the fourth quarter when Planty again tallied.

Madrid Coach Ollie Audet said he was extremely pleased with the showing which his team made this season. He said

that there were many young boys on the team, and that they did a terrific job for him. He said that his team was half passing and half running.

The team's 21-13 win over Heuvelton, he said, was the squad's best game, while the tough loss to Clifton-Fine was the hardest contest of the season.

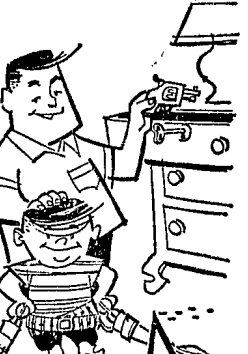

Sandstone Footballers End Season With 2-5 Record

The Potsdam High football forces brought their 1961 campaign to a close on the short end of a 20-7 score in a game with Ogdensburg Free Academy here last Saturday afternoon on Snell Field.

A large and enthusiastic crowd saw this well-played game, which was the season's finale for both teams. Thus the Sandstones end the year with a record of 2 wins and 5 losses, while O. F. A. has a mark of 3 wins and 4 losses. Potsdam scored victories over Saranac Lake and Malone, while losing to Gouverneur, Canton Massena, Tupper Lake, and Ogdensburg.

The big game of the year for undermanned Sandstones was the 13-6 upset triumph over Malone at mid-season. The focus of Coach Hal Gillette opened the year strong with a victory over Saranac Lake. Then they faced Northern Leachampion Gouverneur and were swamped 34-0. They played their first game in Potsdam and lost to rival Canton 20-0, but bounced back to take Malone. The next week they were swamped again at Massena, and lost a heartbreaker to Tupper Lake, 14-13 before the Ogdensburg victory.

This was Gillette's first year of varsity football coaching at Potsdam, and he was plagued by lack of depth and injuries to key personnel. The squad started the year with less than 25 players, and at least three top men were injured before mid-season. Gordon Lewis and Bill Martin were two early-season injuries, and one of the big blows was the loss of quarterback Tony Rishie with an injury sustained in the Canton game. Tom LaDuke, however, took his place and did an outstanding job.

Most of Potsdam's play was team effort, and it would be hard to pick standouts. However, the fine running and all-around play of Marty Sears can not be denied. As the season progressed, Fred Sverdlow also turned out to be a fine back, and was outstanding in the contest last Saturday. Defensive captain Dave Snyder, Gary Henderson, and Newell Johnson all were outstanding for Potsdam.

In the game Saturday, Potsdam drew first blood on its lone tally early in the first quarter, but could not get un-

tracked after that. The blue Devils, meanwhile, tallied in the first, third, and fourth stanzas for the win. Potsdam took the ball on a punt in the first quarter on their own 25. Sears' first down run was unsuccessful. Then on the next play, Sverdlow found running

room around the left side, and aided by a few key blocks, scored all the way, 75 yards for the tally. Sears ran the extra point around left end and Potsdam had a quick 7-0 lead.

However, OFA wasted little time in getting back into the battle. From their own 48, they marched down the field on ground gains shared between their two top performers, quarterback Andy Sullivan and full-back Larry Clouthier. Sullivan got the ball to just about the goal line, and then on the play, which was fourth down, Clouthier dove over. OFA's fine kicker Charles Gogolak converted. The score remained tied at 7-all for the rest of the first half, as neither team could get another drive going. Ogdensburg was knocking at the Potsdam goal, on the five, when the half came to an end. The visitors had the ball on the Postdam 35, when Sullivan threw an 18-yard pass to Gary Oviatie, but time ran out.

In the third period, the Sandstone attack sputtered again, and OFA took over on their own 25. On third down, with some 25 yards for a first, Sullivan faded back to pass, couldn't find a receiver, but found running room around right to the Potsdam 40. A pass was complete to the 30, and Clouthier ran to the 20. After an "off-sides" penalty against the Burg, Sullivan carried, lateraled to Gene White, and White drove to the Potsdam 10. Sullivan, who engineered very well at the quarter-back slot, then threw flat to Bruce Hill to the 5. On the

next play Sullivan went over on a quarterback sneak for the 7. Gogolak's toe made it 14-7.

Late in the fourth quarter, Potsdam's offense again stalled, and the hosts found themselves back on their own 1 yard line. They punted to the Potsdam 30, where an OFA back ran the ball back to the 18. From there Sullivan gained to the Potsdam 10. Despite two "off-Side" calls on the Blue Devils, they managed to get the ball to the 10, where Clouthier scooted around right end for 10 yards and the tally with about a minute left in the contest.

The attempted kick by Gogolak was blocked, and it was the first of his extra point tries that was blocked all season.
