Reports Given At Dairymen's League Sub-District Meeting

Hopkinton — Members of the St. Lawrence County's sub-district of the Dairymen's League Cooperative Association, Inc., met in the Parishville-Hopkinton Central School, Nov. 4, as guests of the Potsdam local.

The first report was presented by Patrick Snell, Potsdam, a member of the Young Cooperators. He said that 276 members of the Young Cooperators attended the annual meeting, and 17 of them were from Franklin and St. Lawrence Counties. There were many speeches, and panel discussions. One of the main speeches was given by Seymour K. Rodenhurst, retiring vice-president and director of the Dairymen's League, who presented a farewell talk to the young group. He outlined three factors which he feels have made the League grow and prosper: the fact that it has been a family affair, its ability to change with the changing times, and its sound financial structure.

A Way of Life
In discussing farming as a way of life, he stressed the fact that "It's the finest kind of life". Rodenhurst was presented with an honorary membership in the youth organization for his many years of service. Ten projects for the coming year were adopted by the Young Cooperator Delegates. The three new projects include farmers and fallout fundamentals of cooperative business and responsible citizenship.

The group voted to continue seven projects: scrapbook, meeting procedures and program plans, quality milk, milk promotion, Keep our Roadsides Clean and Green, and Care, J. O. Sanders, associate in Vocational Agriculture, State Education Department, Albany, also addressed the Young Cooperators. He said that there is an ever increasing need for genuine farm leadership, today since farmers are no longer a majority group. To develop the kind of leadership needed, education is the prime requisite.

Panel Report
Next was a report from Mrs. Howard E. Jenkins, Advisory Committee Woman, who also attended the annual meeting. "What's New in Your Association" was the subject for a panel session: to promote fluid milk and dairy products; awaken member interest; support membership and Young Cooperator program; study legislation and act; encourage rural-urban understanding. These were the Home Service Goals for 1962, adopted by the Dairymen's League women at their annual meeting.

Mrs. Edwin Hadlock, Hammond, Legislative Committee Woman, explained her duties as Legislative Committee Woman, and gave a summary of the 1962 Legislative Objectives. They are as follows: study information supplied by League literature and other sources; understand resolutions adopted at League meetings and acquaint others of these privileges; seek candidates who will support sound agricultural programs. She stressed the point of promoting fluid milk sales.

Resolutions Reported
Frank Davis, Resolutions Committee member, North Bangor, who represented District No. 9, Franklin and St. Lawrence Counties, gave a summary of the resolutions passed at the annual meeting. Resolutions were passed on Management policy, supply management, co-op taxation, bloc voting, support of ADA-NDC, review co-op payments; and the possibility of moving the main office from New York City to Syracuse. A total of 66 resolutions were presented to a committee of 25.

Charles Paddock reported on the Director's meeting, held recently in New York City. He explained the results to Dairymen because of the milk strike in New York City. He gave the blend price of fluid milk, and compared it to the prices received the past three years: 1959, was \$4.49; 1960, was \$4.36, and 1961, \$4.26.

Paddock announced that James Doman, Galway, has been elected to serve on the Executive Committee as Assistant Treasurer. Doman is a former president of the Dairymen's League Young Cooperators, and was elected District 3 Director in 1958. He had previously served as a sub-district secretary-treasurer and local delegate to the Association's annual meetings.

Glenn Talbott is now the newly elected president in place of Russell E. Dennis, the former president. Lester W. Martin was elected First-vice president; Jennings D. Dickens, second vice-president; Milburn Huntley, treasurer; Russell E. Dennis, a member of the Executive Committee.

Paddock also brought up for the discussion, the possibility of changing the sub-district meetings, for St. Lawrence County, to an evening meeting, in place of all day meetings; possibly having all the meetings held at Madrid, the center of the County; and having lunch served by the members of the Young Cooperators. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

Parishville — Mrs. Nina Augusta Daniels, 91, wife of former N. Y. State Assemblyman and attorney Warren O. Daniels, died Friday night at the Peterson Nursing Home in Canton after a long illness. She had been at the nursing home for exactly two years.

Services were held Monday from the Parishville Methodist Church with the Rev. Peter Davis officiating. Burial was in Parishville where friends called Saturday and Sunday. Arrangements were by the Buck Funeral Home.

The bearers were Royal S. Hoyt, Fay J. Duffy, Roy W. Johnson, Douglas F. Kirk, Guy Planty and Ezra Bruce.

Mrs. Daniels is survived by her husband; one son, Assistant District Attorney Roger W. Daniels of Potsdam; one daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Cochran, at home, and three grandsons.

Mrs. Daniels was born in Hannawa Falls June 26, 1870, daughter of Solon and Augusta Glidden Benham. She was graduated in 1892 from Potsdam Normal school, a year before Daniels.

On Aug. 25, 1893, Miss Nina A. Benham and Warren O. Daniels were married at the home of the bride's parents in South

Parishville where he started practicing the following year.

Attorney Daniels, who was 91 on April 15, served in the state assembly from 1934 to 1940. He was supervisor of the town of Parishville for 16 years and chairman of the St. Lawrence county board of supervisors two years. He was chairman of the board of directors and vice president at one time of the People's Bank of Potsdam, later the Potsdam Bank and Trust company.

Mrs. Daniels had the distinction of being awarded a medal by the New York State Press Association as the best rural correspondent in New York state in 1939 and also was awarded a medal for being the second best rural correspondent in the United States. She was the Parishville correspondent for years of the former Potsdam Herald Recorder.

Mrs. Daniels was the first historian of the town of Parishville and held the post until she retired six years ago and Miss Doris Rowland succeeded her. One of her published historical efforts was "The Roads of Parishville."

Mrs. Daniels was a member and past regent of the Nihavnave chapter of the D. A. R. in Potsdam. She was a member of the 50-Year Alumni association

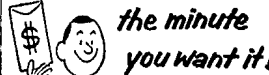
