Madrid-Waddington FFA Completes Annual GLF Crop Demonstration

The Madrid-Waddington F.F.A. Chapter has completed its 1960-61 G.L.F. Crop Demonstration Program that was located on the Marshall-Hargrave Farm on the Madrid-Lisbon road.

The purpose of the demonstration was to show the effect of drainage on forage crops. This forage crop demonstration consisted of three one-half acre plots—each with a different seeding mixture. These seeding mixtures were planted on well-drained and poorly drained land.

Plot number one was seeded to Narragansett alfalfa, and Climax Timothy; plot number two was seeded to Narragansett alfalfa, Climax Timothy, 1 Viking Tree soil; and plot three was seeded to Viking Tree soil and Climax Timothy.

Plot one yielded four tons per acre; plot two yielded three and one half tons per acre and plot number three yielded three point four tons per acre. In addition to the two cuttings, the plot were pastured in August and September.
