

Tech Icemen Shutout Michigan State 3-0

The skating Knights of Clarkson College scored one of their sweetest victories in recent years with a stunning 3-0 shutout of Michigan State here Friday night at the Clarkson Arena. It was Clarkson's third win in as many starts and was goalie Wayne Gibbons' second shutout in three appearances.

The victory was not an easy one for the powerful Green and Gold. The game was a rough and tumble one from the beginning, as both teams displayed outstanding defense with Clarkson getting stronger as the contest progressed. Both squads were hampered by a total of 22 penalties, 8 for Clarkson and 14 for the Spartans. Michigan State spent over half of the second period with less than six men on the ice, but both teams had numerous opportunities to score with a man advantage. Clarkson capitalized on this twice.

The victors scored once in each period for the win. Both squads were slow in starting. Then at 11:55, with the Spartans a man down, center Hal Petersen tipped in the puck from the right side of the cage on a rebound shot of John Chandik's save. Linemate John Neismit and defenseman Paul Brophy got credit for the assists. The Spartans finished the period with three more penalties, including one which carried over to the next frame.

Many Penalties
Both teams began to feel the effects of the officials' whistles in the second stanza as the game got rougher. The Knights had a one-man disadvantage for almost the entire first 10 minutes of play, but superb defensive work and saves by Gibbons prevented State from scoring. Then the Spartans began to get out of hand and at 13:08 with Michigan two men down, Arnie Lawlor slipped the puck past Chandik with defenseman Joe Legari assisting. State continued to pile up penalties, including a 10-minute major for misconduct.

Gibbons did yeoman's work again in the net with 27 saves. It was his second shutout of the young season. He has allowed only two goals to be scored against him, while Tech has piled up 27 points. Chandik had 34 saves and also did a fine job. This was the first time in his career that Clarkson has shutout a Western Division club. Western Division teams have been visiting the North Country periodically since 1950.

Clarkson Cage Team To Open Against Ithaca

The 1961-62 varsity cagers of Clarkson College will open their campaign here next Tuesday against the Ithaca College quintet. Coach Al Chadwick would like nothing better than a fat opening game win here against his Alma Mater. Last year the Golden Knights lost to this downstate troop 89-84 in overtime.

There are two senior members on the court team, center Dick Maag and forward Bob Chiostreri. Maag, one of the taller hoopsters at 6-3½, has improved steadily in the past two seasons and should reach his peak this year. Other veteran members of last year's squad who will play for Chadwick this season include Carl Putnam, Bruce Dart, Mike Moyer, and Jules Pigicampi. All are juniors. Putnam should be one of the mainstays of the Tech attack as he was last season when he poured through an average of 13 points a game.

Dart, who improved tremendously as the season progressed last year, should use his 6 feet, 5 inches to good advantage for the Knights. Moyer and Pigicampi will be backcourt sparkplugs for the outfit.

The factor, however, which will probably make the difference this season is the play of the newcomers on the squad. They include Ray Diederick, Dick Heroux, and John Liljequist from last year's freshman team, plus Joe Brennan, a junior, and Fred Petrovich, a junior transfer student from Broome Tech, where a good brand of basketball is played.

The Ithaca varsity that has been working together includes forwards Bill Schutz of Red Hook, leading scorer on the frosh quintet last year and Jim Lockman of Albany. The team also includes two Northern New York cagers. Don Pazio of Watertown, a sophomore, is considered the team's top shooter. The other prospect is Bob Porter of Gouverneur, 6-2 sophomore forward. Ithaca's record last year was 10 wins and 8 losses.

Frosh Sextet Set To Meet Larries
