Hundreds of souvenir gifts will be distributed — raincoats, measuring spoons and packets of needles. Every hour of the business day, through Saturday of this week, there will be a 12-pound cooked ham awarded. Daily gifts of even greater value are to be awarded through the first and second weeks, ending Saturday, Dec. 9. These are to be a child's jukebox (yesterday), a boy's bicycle today, an electric hair dryer on Friday, and a Tappan gas range on Saturday — and through the second week, the daily gifts will be an electric skillet, transistor radio, steam-dry iron, movie camera, slide projector and the big dish washer.

Countless special values, including coupons offering lower prices, are scheduled over a two-week interval, according to manager Allan Mitchell.

The new store will be open until 9 p.m. each night, except on Saturday when the closing will be at 8 p.m. On Friday and Saturday, the store will open a half-hour early, at 8:30 a.m. Free parking space for nearly 100 cars at one time is a feature of the new store. Of contemporary design, the new store has a battery of mechanized checkouts, assuring speedy passage for shoppers, plus an "express checkout" which will be used by customers with only a few purchases, conserving time. Air conditioning for hot weather comfort and automatic doors that swing wide open as they are approached are among the innovations at the new store.

The total represents an increase of 5,474 students, or 11.5 percent, over the fall 1960 enrollment of 47,654. The number of freshmen has risen from 21,769 to 23,247, an increase of 6.8 percent. Official enrollment at the Potsdam College of the University is 1,481.

Applications Due For AAUW Grant To NY Teachers

Mrs. H. D. Baker, President of the St. Lawrence Co. Branch, American Association of University Women, has announced that the New York State Teachers' Graduate Study Award will again be made this year, in accordance with the biennial AAUW program.

The \$2,000 award, enabling a teacher to pursue a year of advanced study, has previously been awarded five times, in 1952, '54, '56, '58, and in 1960. Requirements for applicants, who must be women teachers in the public schools of New York State, are: 1. Four years of successful teaching experience in N. Y. State public schools; 2. Possession of a bachelor's degree approved by the N. Y. State Board of Regents; 3. Plans for graduate study in a college on AAUW approved list.

Deadline for filing of application is Dec. 15, and the award will be made at the State Convention in Rochester, in May of 1962. Funds for this scholarship are raised by the 52 local AAUW Branches in New York State.
