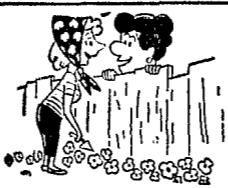

Milk Marketing Program Slated Dec. 4-7 At Madrid Library

Madrid — A special milk marketing information program for all St. Lawrence County dairy farmers will be held Dec. 4-7 in Hephurn Library. The session is sponsored by the Metropolitan Cooperative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency of Syracuse which represents several cooperatives in this area.

Field School Director Robert Wiggins, in announcing the school, said it is open to all dairy farmers in the area regardless of cooperative affiliation, if any. The program will run from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day with lunch served free.

The program is aimed at giving dairymen a better understanding of milk orders, laws, regulations, organizations and state and federal units which affect the conduct of their business. Nearly 3,000 have attended the Bargaining Agency since it was inaugurated in 1956.

Topics to be discussed include New York State Milk Control, National Sanitation Code, Role of Government in Business, Order 27, Bulk Tanks, Cooperative Organization, and many current problems. Program instructors include:

Robert L. Wiggins, program director, who has supervised the program since 1957. He is a graduate of Cornell University and operates his own farm.

L. L. Clough, assistant director of the New York State Division of Milk Control, has been with the State Department of Agriculture since 1938.

Dr. Robert Sedgwick, professor of economics, Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. Dr. Sedgwick is the author

of numerous professional articles and consultant on industrial relations to numerous business firms.

Leslie Deming, assistant Bargaining Agency counsel, and a member of the law firm of Bond, Schoeneck and King of Syracuse, who is highly familiar with the intricacies of milk marketing orders and legislation.

Arthur D. Little, Bargaining Agency economist, is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and received his masters degree at the University of Connecticut. He has been with the Bargaining Agency since 1956.

Clare L. Pinea, Bargaining Agency research economist, is a graduate of Massachusetts State College and received his masters degree in agriculture from Cornell.

Robert C. Forsythe, Bargaining Agency manager, is a Cornell graduate and formerly was active in county extension work. He also taught high school agriculture for some time.

Ralph D. Smith, a Cornell graduate, has been with the Agency since 1939. He has served as fieldman and is presently Field Supervisor.
