## CCT Graduates Publish Second Volume Of Engineering Papers

The graduate students at Clarkson College published volume II, number 1 of the "Journal of Engineering and Science" on Dec. 12, 1962. Edited by Donald R. Falkenberg, teaching assistant in mechanical engineering, the journal's purpose is to foster individual educational growth by giving graduate students an opportunity to publish their technical papers.

The present issue contains the following articles: "Non-Physical—A Projection of the Real Axis" by John O. Bertotti; "Seals for Ultra-High Vacuum" by C. Joseph Lamando; "Structural Bending Affects Control of Guided Missiles" by Falkenberg; and "Electrochemical Machines" by Donald O. Bliven.

All the authors are Clarkson graduates who are doing advanced study toward the master's of mechanical engineering degree.

Bertotti, who received his B.M.E. from Clarkson in 1962, is a research assistant and presently is engaged in developing an interdisciplinary laboratory program under a grant from the National Science Foundation.

Lamando completed his undergraduate requirements at Clarkson in 1961. He went to work for the United States Army Electronics Research and Development Laboratory at Fort Monmouth, N. J., where he was involved in space simulation. It was there that he first became interested in vac-

## Mark Snyder, Charged With Local Gas Station Robbery, Arraigned

Canton — Among the arraignments held Friday in Supreme Court here before Justice Paul D. Graves was Mark Anthony Snyder. Snyder, 22, is charged with burglary third and petit larceny committed in the Town of Potsdam. He is specifically accused of breaking into and entering the Tucker Chevron Station on Maple Street, and of taking \$20 in bills, \$10 in change, about \$8 from the cigarette machine and six packs of cigarettes.

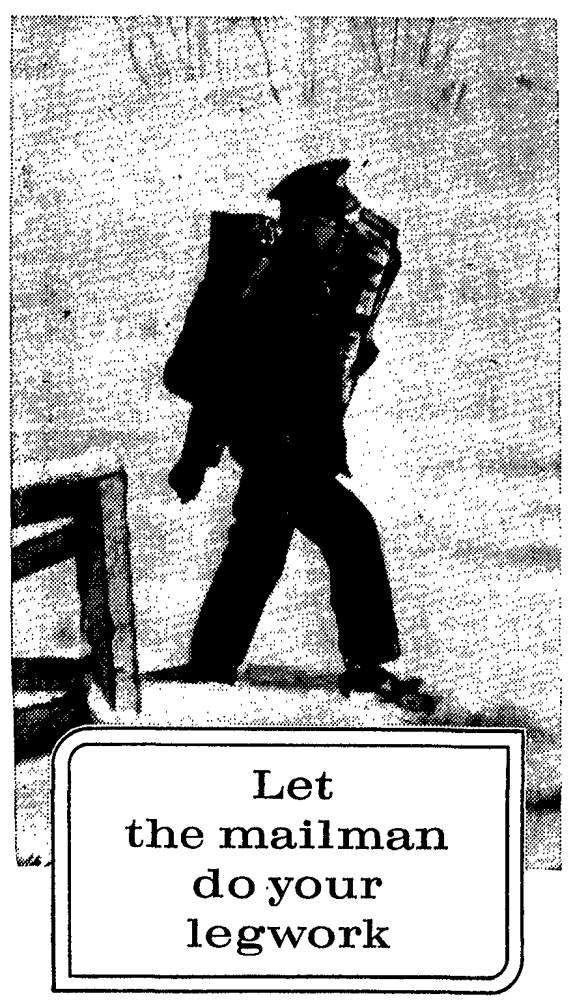
