County Fire Coordinator George Briggs was on hand to distribute diplomas to the graduates. Briggs also spoke on "Detection of Fallout" pointing out the amount of radioactive fallout in St. Lawrence County, how it is detected and what is used to combat its spread.

He said that common carriers such as trains, buses and airplanes often carry fallout with them. In many cases airplanes which have been traveling at high altitudes pick up fallout in the atmosphere and carry it back to earth. He warned that

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Four Injured In Head-On Collision Sunday

Norwood — Four persons were injured early Sunday night after a head-on collision during a blinding snowstorm mid-way between the villages of Potsdam and Norwood.

Injured were: Glenn Royce, 17, who received a severe laceration to the forehead; his father, Elwood Royce, 52, operator of Royce's Clothing Store in Norwood, who was badly shaken up but not hospitalized; a third passenger in the Royce car, Miss Linda Donnelly, 18, Norfolk, suffered shock, and James H. Currier, assistant editor of the Potsdam Courier and Freeman, who received a cut to his lower lip.

Currier and the two Royce men are both residents of Norwood.

According to reports by the Sheriff's Department night patrol, the Currier car was proceeding south towards Potsdam and the Royce car was traveling in the opposite direction at the time of the crash.

Apparently neither car did not see the other until the time of impact. Police described visibility as "zero" at the time.

Elwood Royce was the operator of his car with his son and friend as passengers. Currier was traveling alone. Neither driver was ticketed.

Frank Vaisey Dies In Rochester; Was Former Norwood Resident

Norwood — Frank A. Vaisey, 66, a former resident of Norwood and a semi-professional baseball and basketball player, died at the Strong Memorial Hospital, Rochester, on Jan. 12.

The Vaisey family were residents of Norwood several years ago. At that time he worked for the Racquette River Paper Company and for a time worked on the seaway construction as a machinist with Ferris Company.

He was chaplain of the Clark-Robinson Post American Legion of Norwood and active in the Norwood Little League.

Mr. Vaisey was born in Rochester and was a tool maker at Gleason Works until 1932. In World War I he served in the 309th Field Artillery and later with the 30th Infantry in Europe.

He was taken prisoner by the Germans but escaped and later was wounded by shrapnel and suffered gas poisoning in action.

His war injuries necessitated extensive hospitalization during his lifetime.

Surviving are his wife, Evelyn; two sons, Robert of Franklinville and Maj. Gerald Vaisey of Maplewood; five sisters, Katherine, Frances, Alice, Ruth and Elsie Vaisey; four brothers, William, Charles, Harold, and John Vaisey; and five grandchildren.
