Funeral services for Nora J. Garvey, 86, of Nicholville, were held Thursday, Jan. 17 at the Church of the Holy Cross, Hopkinton with the Rev. Albert Plante officiating. Burial will be in the St. Lawrence Cemetery in the spring.

**Moulton Tips On Social Security**

John P. Moulton, social security district manager in Ogdensburg, offered a few tips this week on how to get your first social security check when it is due.

If you are nearing retirement, he suggests that you get in touch with your social security office, and take some proof of your age with you. Have a member of his staff examine whatever proof you may have to see if it will be acceptable when you do retire.

Should you need better evidence of your date of birth, you will be given information to help you get that additional evidence.

If you are within three months of retirement age, the social security office can take your application for benefits now. Go to the social security office and take with you proof of your age and your social security card, of course.

Moulton said that even though you are still working and are 65 years old, you can apply at any time. Many people think that you have to retire completely to get any benefits. This is not true.
