South Colton Father Of 11, Chester Olmstead, Dies

South Colton — Funeral services for Chester Olmstead, father of 11 children and winner of the Distinguished Flying Cross in World War II, were held Jan. 23 in the Buck Funeral Home, Potsdam, with the Rev. Peter Ward officiating. Burial was in St. Patrick's Cemetery.

Mr. Olmstead, 41, died Jan. 7 in the Potsdam Hospital. He served in the Air Force for four years during World War II, and was decorated four times. Honors included The Distinguished Flying Cross with an oak leaf cluster; The Air Medal with three oak clusters; The Good Conduct Ribbon; and Southwest Pacific Theatre Ribbon with two battle stars. He served from 1942 to 1946.

Surviving are his wife, Helen, 11 children, Sharon, Norma, Patty, Chester, Jr., Richard, Helen, Sheryll, Tommy, Larry, Jerry, and Kathy, all at home; his mother, Edith Olmstead; a brother, George of Massena; and a sister, Jean McGrath in Utah.

The son of the late Chester and Edith Alford Olmstead, Mr. Olmstead was born in Ogdensburg and spent his early life in Colton. He attended Colton schools and married Helen on Sept. 2, 1940 in Kansas. The family has resided in South Colton for many years. Mr. Olmstead was employed as a truck driver.

Employers have until Jan. 31, 1963, to file quarterly social security reports on wages paid their employees during October, November and December. Failure to prepare correct and timely reports may cause loss of benefits or delay in receipt of payments due the employee and his family at the time of retirement, disability, or death.

Employees of a regular trade or business must have their earnings reported even though the total wages are small. Domestic employees and other household workers who work in a private home must have their cash earnings reported if they are paid cash wages of \$50 or more, by one employer, during the calendar quarter.

Employees who have questions about their quarterly social security reports should get in touch with the Internal Revenue Office. Social security information can be obtained by calling or visiting your social security district office located at 306 Catherine St., Ogdensburg, N. Y.

Austrian Prof Joins Clarkson Research Staff

The appointment of Dr. Gilbert E. A. Janauer of Vienna, Austria, as a research associate at Clarkson College has been announced by Lowell W. Heron, acting president of the college.

Dr. Janauer, who came to Clarkson in November, has a doctor of philosophy degree which he received from the University of Vienna last June. He has done various kinds of chemical laboratory work in a City of Vienna Laboratory and in the laboratories of the Austrian Government since 1958.

In 1961-62 he was a university assistant at the Analytical Institute of the University of Vienna where he took part in an extensive research program on exchange of uranium and thorium, sponsored by the IAEA and the USAEC.

A prolific writer, Dr. Janauer has written or co-authored 17 articles for scientific publications. Ten have been in English and seven in German.

The new research associate has been a member of the Austrian Chemical Society since 1952 and has recently been elected a member of the American Chemical Society.

A seasoned traveler of Europe, Dr. Janauer also has special interests in nooks, music, photography and sports. He has been a member of the Austrian Skiing Club since 1955, the Academic Boxing Club of Vienna since 1952 and the Austrian "Alpenvereiner" since 1955. Having been a ski instructor for the University of Vienna and in the ski-school of Igls, Austria during winter vacations while studying in Austria, he is now teaching a class of children of Clarkson faculty staff members on the Clarkson slope on weekends. (The 1964 Winter Olympics will take place in Igls, and Innsbruck, Austria.)

Dr. Janauer's wife and year-old son, Gerald, are still in Vienna, but will fly by jet plane to Montreal on Feb. 23, where they will be met at the airport and brought to Potsdam by car. He is now living at 17 Bay St. in Potsdam at the home of Mrs. Lloyd Keller, but expects to rent a house in the vicinity of the college before his family arrives.

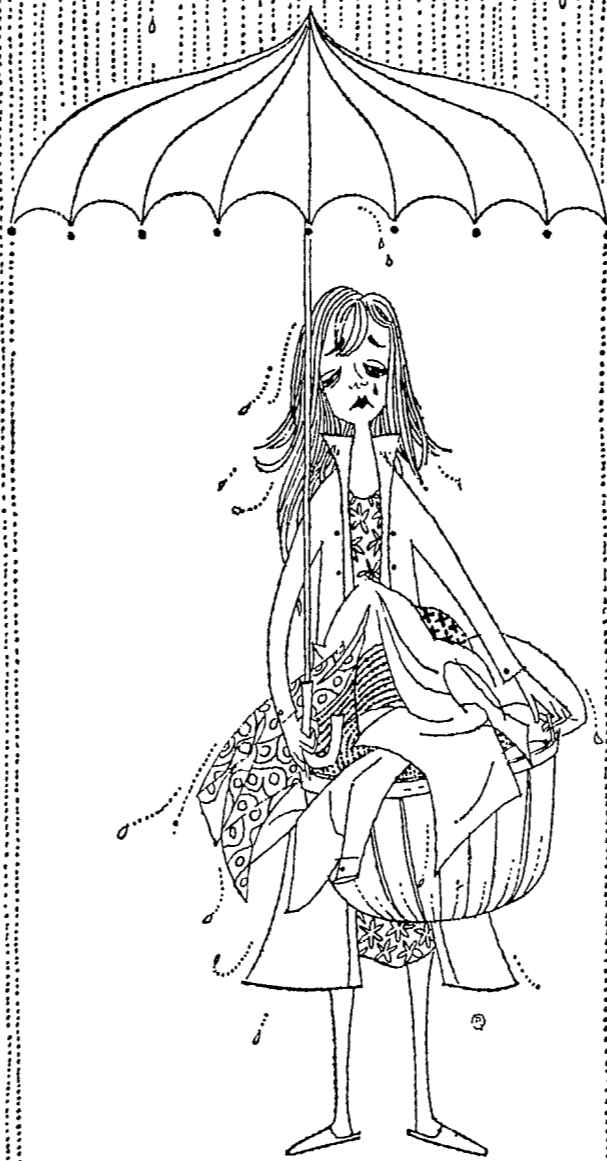
