

2 Major Dairy Groups Give Reasons For Split

- Bargaining Agency - - Dairy League -

Syracuse — A major split between two of the New York milkshed's largest cooperative federations loomed here today with the announcement by the Metropolitan Cooperative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency, a federation of over 90 federated milk producer cooperatives, that it was requesting the Dairyman's League, the largest single operating cooperative in the nation, to withdraw its membership from the Agency.

In a joint announcement, Agency President Ward Phelps and Manager Robert C. Forsythe said the Agency's Board of Directors made the request with regret, noting that the League was one of the major founders of the Agency in 1937.

Reason for the split, Phelps said, was "an increasing and overwhelming conflict of interests along with the question of unequal control held by the League in the Agency's policy making House of Delegates and Board of Directors."

Forsythe explained that the League with about 11,000 Federal Order 2 dairy farmer members had full veto power in the House of Delegates and three members on the 15-man Board of Directors while contributing less dues than the average federated cooperative with 150 members. Although the League has never used this power, Forsythe noted, it could be used to the detriment of the Agency in case of a major difference of opinion on Agency policy.

Over the years, he said, there have been some differences which have required concessions on the part of one or the other. As the Agency and the League gradually head in conflicting directions, primarily as regards membership, there is reason to believe that this power could be disastrous to the Agency. The Agency spokesmen noted

New York City—The ending of a formal membership relationship between two New York State Dairy cooperatives was announced by the Dairyman's League Cooperative Association and the Metropolitan Cooperative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency.

In a statement issued from the New York City headquarters of the league, Glenn Talbot, league president, said that the move was made by both sides with regret, but with "understanding, respect and good will." The league has been an associate member of the agency and was one of its founders.

He explained the Co-Op's action by pointing out that the nature of the bargaining agency "has changed in recent years from a bargaining forum for many cooperatives in which policy positions and market order improvements were the principle business, to an organization primarily engaged in building a physical marketing program for members, milk."

Respect Desire — "We respect the desire of the leaders of the agency to establish a marketing program," Talbot said. "The agency has had an extensive marketing program for 40 years. It is our belief, however, that the best interests of all producers would have been served if the league and the agency had been able to find common grounds for a merger or affiliation."

"The league has millions of dollars invested in farmer-owned country plants, bulk tank operations, city branches, ice cream plants and three of the largest dairy product manufacturing plants in the country, and we believe a combined venture would have been most desirable without the building or acquiring of more expensive facilities by either the league members or agency co-op members."

"Many meetings were held between our organizations without the emergence of a plan acceptable to both groups."

Fort Plain Plant — "In the meantime," said the league president, "the agency acquired a large manufacturing plant in Fort Plain and announced plans to use it as the keystone of a new marketing program. We sincerely wish them all the luck and prosperity in the world in this venture. It is plain, however, that the heavy financial investment in the Ft. Plain enterprise has committed the agency to a 'go it alone' policy and this has led to the decision by the agency to request that the league dissolve its associate membership in that organization."

"Since duplication of marketing effort will not serve any useful purpose, we willingly, but with some apprehension for the future well being of the agency, have agreed to withdraw."

"Over 40 years of operating plants and other facilities, we have learned the costly lesson that one manufacturing plant does not make for either marketing or financial success."

"We stand ready to cooperate with the agency in every way in the future as we have in the past," concluded Talbot.
