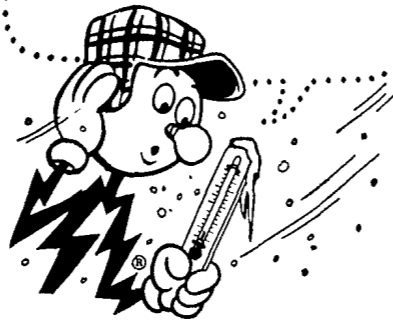

3 New English Faculty Join Potsdam State

New members of the English department at The State University College at Potsdam are Dr. Glenn O. Carey, Dr. Richard K. Meeker and Miss Adrienne C. Zahler. The appointments were announced by Dr. Frederick W. Crump, president of the college.

Dr. Meeker came to Potsdam from Longwood College, Virginia, where he taught for nine years. He has taught also at Bay Path Junior College, Springfield College and the University of Pennsylvania.

A graduate of Lafayette, Dr. Meeker earned master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees at the University of Pennsylvania. He has also done graduate study at the Bread Loaf School of English, Middlebury, the University of Vermont, and Georgetown University.

Recently Dr. Meeker, author of several literary articles, was awarded a \$1,000 fellowship by the Research Foundation of the State University of New York to do research next summer on a discussion of 62 novels of the 18th century. He has been appointed professor of English at Potsdam.

Dr. Carey, also a new professor of English, attended St. Vincent College in Pennsylvania and holds two degrees from the Pennsylvania State University. He received a doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Illinois.

These social security checks can be endorsed and cashed only by the person whose name appears on the check. Checks payable to deceased persons or to persons no longer competent to endorse their checks must be returned.
