About this time each winter we turn our attention to the local pee-wee program in this area, as the eager youngsters, their coaches and sponsors celebrate "Youth Hockey Week — U.S.A." This is a national program celebrated by leagues with junior hockey programs in all corners of the country from California, Minnesota, and New York. This year the program is being celebrated locally on two weekends. Last weekend teams from Potsdam, Canton, and Norwood-Norfolk, among others, traveled to Cornwall, Ont. to participate in an International Bantam Tournament program. This coming weekend, the annual "Experience In International Living" (as we like to call it) will begin when pee-wee and bantam teams from Mount Royal, Que. come to Potsdam for games with our youngsters Saturday and Sunday. The local lads will make a return visit to the Montreal suburb the following weekend. While in Potsdam, the Canadian juniors will stay in local homes, and that in itself, will be of great benefit.

I feel that this year we have special reason to celebrate "National Youth Hockey Week." The program in this area has been in effect now just long enough so that the first "graduates" who have been fortunate enough to continue their hockey careers are beginning to show the results of their early training. From all over the East, reports are coming in from colleges who are getting excellent results from American skaters from New England and Northern New York, who have been products of effective Junior Hockey Programs. Here in our own locale, St. Lawrence University's icemen have elevated themselves to a position as one of the powers of Eastern collegiate hockey thanks to the aid of their "local" talent — all former pee-wees. It all started with the Larries' win over Clarkson several weeks ago — a win no one denies they deserved. And the winning goal in overtime was scored by Paul Wicks, a former pee-wee, SLU varsity team, a Canton native, and a former peewee. One of the other two goals was scored by Wayne Mousavi, another Canton pee-wee product, while Al Bloomer is also a member of the St. Lawrence team and a former Canton peewee star.

Closer to home, Clarkson has begun to reap the benefit of local talent, and it is predicted that more will join the squad as time passes. On this year's Tech Freshman team, which, unfortunately, had to drop its schedule due to lack of manpower, one of two goals was a former Norwood-Norfolk Central High ice star and a pee-wee player in that league, Fran La Barge. Of course, a number of Potsdam boys are now playing collegiate hockey — all of whom received basic training in the Potsdam pee-wee program. John Snyder, who played for Potsdam High last year, is now on the St. Lawrence frosh team, and doing very well. John Fiske, one of the first "graduate pee-wees" to play college hockey, is now in the Junior year at Dartmouth, and although the team is not doing too well, John is doing his part to spark the squad. Then, of course, there are Steve Riggs and Dave Healey, both local products now on the amazing Colgate University varsity ice team.

Colgate, at present, is the leading ECAC team in the East, with a top record of 13-1. Riggs is the leading scorer on the team, and one of the top scorers in collegiate hockey in the East. There's no doubt that Colgate realizes the importance of junior hockey programs. A recent release from their publicity office reads as follows:

"Hamilton, N. Y. — Can a college start from scratch and develop a winning hockey team inside of four years? "Ole Kollovold of Colgate thinks so and his team backs him up with a convincing argument. His Red Raiders have won 12 of their first 13 games this year after starting their rebuilding campaign in the winter of 1959-60 with a 6-10 mark.

"Homegrown talent has been the key to the rapid rise, according to the coach. All but one of his squad of 21 skaters hale from New England, New York or Minnesota. Pee-wee hockey gave all but three of them their real head start in the sport.

"Artificial rinks are springing up all over the country with more than 400 noted at the latest count. Most of them now are fostering pee wee programs which Kollovold thinks will feed the college teams of the future.

"The village of Hamilton is in the second year of its pee wee program with some 72 youngsters playing a weekly schedule on the University's rink. A surprising number appear to have college potential, Kollovold thinks.

"Five northern New Yorkers now skating with the Red Raiders show the advantages of an early start. Steve Riggs, the leading scorer, and Dave Healey are graduates of the Potsdam pee wee program. Win Guilmette learned his hockey in Canton. Mike Jukoski did the same in Massena and Kurt Brown began his goal-tending at Alexandria Bay.

"The same early foundation has aided almost every one of the 17 regulars who have carried Colgate hockey to a point where the team has run up a total of 89 goals while yielding a meager 16.

Now if local hockey buffs want further proof of how pee-wee "grads" are making out, they have only to reserve the date of Wednesday, Feb. 13 when the high-flying Colgate team pays a call on Clarkson College in a varsity game in the Arena. I have a feeling that there will be as much excitement for that contest as there will be for the St. Lawrence and B.C. contests later in the month. And, as far as I'm concerned, Clarkson may have its hands just as full with the Red Raiders.

In any event, the success of the junior hockey program speaks for itself. However, there's more to it than just producing future collegiate hockey stars. It is interesting to note that, at the tournament last Saturday in Cornwall, both Potsdam and Canton Bantam All-Star teams lost (a most unusual situation), but the Norwood team won. We're sure that the Norwood fans were thrilled, and well they should be, for the Norwood area is producing some fine hockey players. This was evident last Saturday when the Flying N varsity team played very tough Alexandria Bay. Although they lost 6-2, they gave a very good account of themselves. Other areas also have started and are improving junior hockey programs, including the Brasher Falls area.

Naturally not all of these youngsters playing hockey will become future collegiate stars, and many will not even play in high school. However, this is true in any junior athletic program — baseball, football, etc. Yet these youngsters are having a ball just playing and being a part of a fine program such as junior hockey. I am so glad and grateful to see that the Potsdam Junior Hockey program officers decided to reevaluate their program somewhat, and this year, have reemphasized the Saturday morning play. All-star teams are still an important part of any such activity, but their "importance" is being kept in proportion with the ultimate purpose of the program. As far as I'm concerned, everyone benefits from such thinking. I see happy, contented groups of young boys coming back from the hockey arena each Saturday morning, skates over their shoulders and carrying their sticks, and I have a feeling that they're grateful just for the chance to play. There will be plenty of time for travel and out-of-town competition as they progress up the hockey ladder. Now is the time to learn the fundamentals of both hockey and sportsmanship.

This is a big salute to the many people in many places connected with pee-wee hockey. Their service is invaluable to a community, and they are a very important part of this nation's growing "physical fitness" program. This is the week they should be saluted, and if you're a parent with a youngster in the junior hockey program, the next time you take your lads to the rink for skating, take a minute out to express your appreciation for those who make this all possible.

Coach Lou La Grand's team, still third in the nation in defense among small college teams, has been idle because of exams and mid-semester break since whipping Plattsburgh State 68-42 on Jan. 15. Despite vacation, the team resumed drills here Monday in preparation for the Roberts Wesleyan game.

Wesleyan is expected to be tough on the road, and the two games with Oswego and Buffalo in three days could go far in determining the team's chances for a berth in the State University tournament at Cortland starting Feb. 28.

Coach Lou La Grand said this week he has been pleased with the "good team effort" put forth by the Maroon and Gray to date. Hal Miller, Nick Verini and Pat Leamy drew words of praise from the Potsdam mentor for their exceptionally good defensive play.

In addition, Miller and Capt. Richie Stopa are tied at 11.5 points each in offensive statistics, followed closely by Verini and Leamy.

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Madrid Adds Morristown To Clean Slate

was high scorer for the invaders with 22 points for the evening.

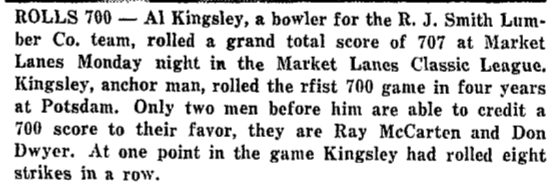
The Norwood JV's ran their undefeated string up to 10-0 in the first game as they defeated the Canton JV's 39-32.

The Potsdam High Basketball team will be looking for an opportunity to raise its won-lost record in the Northern League this Friday and Tuesday nights. On Friday night the Sandstoners will meet Saranac Lake at Potsdam and will meet Norwood at Norwood on Tuesday. Potsdam has a 3-6 record for the season, and is tied with Gouverneur for sixth place in the League.

A fourth period scoring drive by Massena High gave them a 52-41 victory over the Sandstoners last Tuesday night in Potsdam. The game was marked by fairly even play throughout the first three quarters, but Massena forged ahead at the end to take the win.

Important Tests Ahead For Clarkson Icemen

The Golden Knight sextet of Clarkson Tech has a busy month ahead with nine contests scheduled during February. The skaters have four games within the next week.

Friday, Feb. 1, they start against Sir George Williams at the Clarkson Arena at 8:00 p.m. Then they take to the road to invade Princeton on Tuesday, Feb. 5, and Providence on Wednesday, Feb. 6. The sextet returns home on Friday, Feb. 8, to host Queens in a game which is part of the Clarkson Tech-State University College Ice Carnival program.

Clarkson will carry an 11-3 overall record against Sir George Williams. The two teams have met twice since 1960 and the visitors have gone down in defeat both times. Last year the Golden Knights shut out the Canadian team 10-0.

With a game scheduled with Yale on Feb. 2, Princeton is on the short end of a 2-11 record. Its wins have been over Middlebury 8-2 and Brown 6-2. The Clarkson-Princeton series began in 1927 and the record shows 11 wins for each team. Last season the Golden Knights shut out Princeton 8-0.
