Mutual Coop Sets Malone Meeting

All area dairymen are invited to attend a special milk marketing information meeting called for Wednesday, Feb. 6 at the Malone Grange Hall, Malone from 11 a. m. to 3:30 p. m.

The meeting is sponsored by the Mutual Federation of Independent Cooperatives to discuss important problems facing dairymen in the New York-New Jersey milkshed. Topics for discussion will include: (1) The threatened loss of markets for Class III milk; (2) the need for a more equitable pricing system in the Federal Order #2 marketing area; and (3) the outlook for national dairy legislation in the 88th Congress.

Members of the Mutual Federation Staff will be on hand to present factual information on these and other topics. The proposed "Two-Price Plan", approved by Mutual's Board of

Directors, will be explained in detail and ample time will be given to questions from dairymen attending the meeting.

Daniel J. Carey, manager of the Mutual Federation, has described the present dairy situation in the Northeast as "the most critical in the last 25 years". He adds that the Mutual Federation is conducting information meetings for milk producers during January and February throughout the entire milkshed, for the purpose of bringing the facts directly to the attention of dairy farmers.

"All dairymen, regardless of their marketing affiliation, are invited to attend the meetings," Carey said. Luncheon will be served.
