Business Counselling Offered Local Women

Free counsel on marketing a home or hand-made product or on establishing a small business will be available to women locally in most areas of the State from the State Commerce Department Women's Program business consultants during 1963, according to a new plan announced recently in Albany by Deputy Commissioner Guin Hall, Woman's Program head.

Miss Hall said that Mrs. Mildred E. Meskill of the Program's Albany office will counsel in upstate localities.

"The Program counseled more than 5,000 women individually in person, by mail, and by telephone from our offices in 1962," Miss Hall said, "and 15,510 were served through area clinics, workshops and other Program projects. We feel, however, that business advice is most helpful when given on a person-to-person basis, where the Consultant can have immediate and full information on all the facts she considers pertinent." Miss Hall pointed out that under the new plan more women will be able to avail themselves of this free business counselling service.

North Country Kitchen...

The aroma of hot cinnamon and apples can be mighty tantalizing, particularly so, when the source of such goodness is a piping hot muffin.

Muffins can present a few problems to the inexperienced cook. A muffin should be tender with a rounded, pebbly top. The interior should be fine-grained with small uniform air cells. How often have we seen muffins with smooth pointed tops and tunnels inside?

To avoid these tough, tunnelled products, mix the batter only until the dry ingredients are moistened. In order to accomplish this, add the liquid ingredients all at once to a "well" in the middle of the dry ingredients. This technique helps to accomplish blending with very few strokes. Remember, too, that each time you dip into the batter to fill the pans, you are further mixing the batter. So try to make one dip sufficient for each muffin.

Now after these few pointers you should be ready to turn out a very scrumptious product. These sugary apple-spice muffins were my favorites at Cornell where they were frequently served at breakfast in the College of Home Economics.

Sugary Apple-Spice Muffins

Yield: 10 medium muffins
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup milk
1 egg
1/4 cup oil
1 cup finely chopped apple
