

Literary Club Hears Freedom Foundation Talk

Norwood — Mrs. George L. Shepard, Norwood, was principal speaker at the January meeting of the Norwood Literary Club meeting in her home with 24 members attending. Mrs. Shepard spoke on the Freedom Foundation as she saw it in action during her recent visit to Valley Forge, Pa.

In late December, while visiting her son and family, she attended a meeting of the Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge. Former President Dwight Eisenhower, Chairman of the Freedom Foundation Board of Directors, was the main speaker.

Mrs. Shepard reported that a group of three buildings are being planned to carry on the work of the Freedom Foundation. She said that one of the buildings is now open; the Martha Washington Building, first public building to be named after a President's wife.

The building will house a large library for research work and may be used by people of our nation or for students from foreign nations, she said. It was also brought out that the aim of the Freedom Foundation is summed up in its publication, the American Creed, and is brought to millions of people via radio, television and newspapers.

Mrs. Shepard said the Freedom Foundation was formed in 1949 and is principally aimed at informing the masses of the American ways of life and to help combat the spread of Communism.

She said that J. Edgar Hoover, head of the FBI, was also at the meeting and at one point said, "The nation can be thankful for Freedom Foundation which stands as a sentinel as did our Revolutionary Freedom Fighters here at Valley Forge."

The teachers say it also helps the student relax and leaves him or her rested and ready for the more difficult studies.

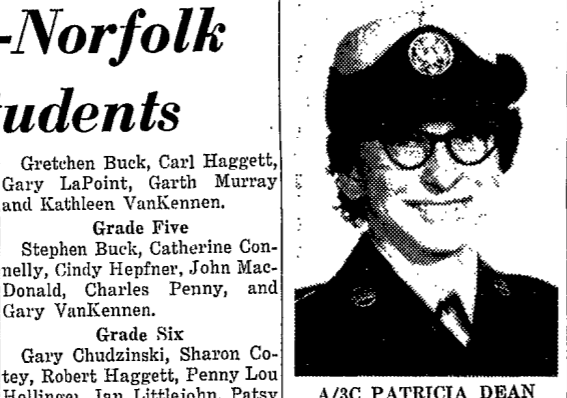

"He was born in Maine on Apr. 8, 1874 and quietly slipped away to his eternal rest on Feb. 28, 1949."
