

Thirty-Third Annual Ice Carnival Begins Today

Ice Show Will Kickoff Weekend Of Festivities

Work and plans of an entire year will be brought to fruition this weekend as an "Oriental Sleighride" brings hundreds of visitors to a festive Potsdam for the 33rd State University College - Clarkson College Ice Carnival.

Major events of the Carnival get underway tonight at 7 with the Ice Show, aptly titled "Far East Frolics," and continue through Sunday afternoon for the Jazz Concert. High point, of course, is the Saturday evening Ball.

New this year is a policy of having all King and Queen candidates reign over Carnival festivities until midway through the Ball, when the winners are announced.

The current Cavalcade of Royalty presents the following senior State University coeds as Queen candidates: Linda Calzada of Clayton; Carol Guarnieri of Endicott; Barbara Sanborn of Batavia; Marty Trembley of Syracuse; and Nancy Weber of Rochester.

Return of the King campaign after a one-year absence presents the following Clarkson seniors as candidates: Al Boccola, Syosset; Bob Cook, Farmington, Conn.; Wayne Gibbons, St. Catharines, Ont.; Bert Halliwell, Sudbury, Ont.; Hal Pettersen, Falmouth, Ont.; Chuck Walcer, Brooklyn, and Barry "Choc" Weintraub, Woodridge.

Aerial fireworks high above Clarkson Hill follow the Ice Show and should be a spectacular announcement to neighboring communities of gala happenings in Potsdam. Later "warm-up" dances in the two Clarkson Hill Dorm cafeterias will feature the Beta Band and the DK Combo, Cookies and hot chocolate will be served.

After Friday classes the pace picks up again with basketball and hockey games followed by fraternity and frosh "vie" parties. Potsdam State meets Buffalo State for basketball at 8 p.m. in the State gym, while Clarkson's hockey Knights take on Queens University at the Arena also at 8 p.m.

Although the game is part of Clarkson's regular schedule, it is not open to season ticket holders. However, reserved and general admission tickets will be on sale at the door for students and public. Purpose of this is for as many students and their escorts as possible to see the contest from either side of the rink. In the past, students had often brought dates from out-of-town to see the fabled Golden Knights only to find a sellout crowd on hand.

On Saturday Saturday's busy schedule begins with a "hangover" breakfast at the Arena followed by skiing and skating competition

and events for students. Action at the Clarkson Slope on Outer Clarkson Ave. starts at 9 a.m., while skating activity back at the Arena is scheduled for 10-10. A highlight of the latter event will be an inter-college faculty broom hockey game. A large turnout is expected.

In the only sports action that afternoon, Potsdam State hosts Rochester Tech in basketball at 3 p.m. in the State gym.

Meanwhile, decorating crews will have invaded the Clarkson gym to transform it into a "Tea House of Winter Royalty" for the Ball, a semi-formal affair featuring music by Stan Rubin's Orchestra and Tigertown Five Dixieland ensemble. Midway through the 10 p.m.-2 a.m. dance, winners and wards for the various competitions will be announced and the King and Queen will be presented for the first time.

Rounding out Ice Carnival is the annual Jazz Concert at 2 p.m. Sunday in the State gym featuring Lambert, Hendricks & Bavan with the Gildo Mahones Trio and Pony Poindexter. Open to the public, admission is 50 cents.

Co-chairmen for the 1963 Ice Carnival are Lynn DeHollander of Schenectady and Gary Morrow of Canton.

Ice Statue Maps Available Downtown

Downtown Potsdam merchants, through the Chamber of Commerce, are participating in this year's Ice Carnival event with window paintings in many of the stores and distribution of a map of Potsdam showing the location of the various ice statues.

The ice statue map (similar to the one on the opposite page) is something new this year. Over 3,000 of these have been distributed to most downtown merchants. It is hoped that residents and visitors to Potsdam will use the map as a guide when they view the statues on display this weekend.

A total of 17 Clarkson and State College fraternities, sororities, and independent living centers are participating in the window painting Carnival event.

One of the most popular events of Potsdam's Ice Carnival is the annual Ice Show. And, the '63 edition promises to keep up the tradition. "Far East Frolics," title of this year's Show, features numerous skits, precision skating numbers and production pieces, all with Oriental flavor.

"Oriental Waltz" spotlights five couples as well as 25 "Gelsia Girls," while "Chan's Coolies" perform a men's precision-skating number.

A trio of Carol Novak, Elaine Bartlett and Judy Chicaot will perform; husband - and - wife team Frank and Louise Richens have a spot, as do Nancy Baldwin and Tom Williams from St. Lawrence University.

Comedy skits by the ensemble will feature the "Super Teachers" and a humorous "Japanese Dragon Dance."

Special guest performer will be 15-year-old Judy Novak of Syracuse. A sophomore at Solway High School, Judy is a member of the Syracuse Skating Club and has been skating in shows for nine years. She was chosen queen of the 10th Annual Syracuse Ice Carnival.

Choreography for the Show, free and open to the public, was done by the cast under co-chairman Carol Woytek of Potsdam and Tom Fitzgerald of Cape Vincent. Winners' trophies will be awarded at the Ball that night.

Thrills & Spills In Line For Ski Competition

Thrills and, probably, some chilly spills will mark Ice Carnival Skiing and Skating Events and competition Saturday morning.

Ski action begins at 9 a.m. at Clarkson Ski Slope on Outer Clarkson Avenue. Events include a women's downhill, a men's jump, slalom and obstacle competition for both men and women. Refreshments will be served and bonfires will make things comfortable for the less hardy. Transportation will be available from the State campus to the event.

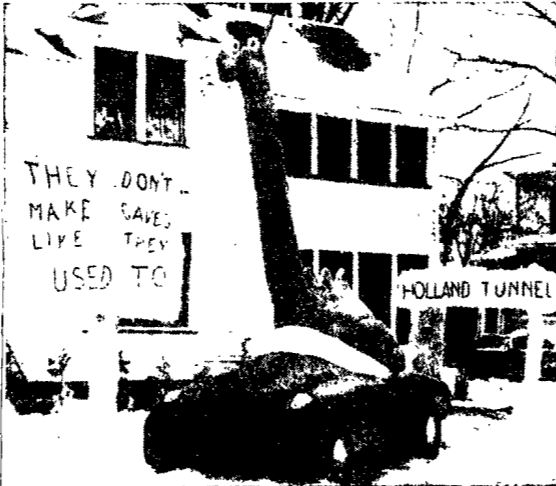
Then, back to the Clarkson Arena for a "hangover breakfast" at 10 a.m. and time for skating contests. Highlight of this will be a broom hockey game between faculty members of the two colleges. In addition, relays, single and obstacle competition for men and women and barrel-jumping for men are also scheduled.
