Bishop Brown To Visit Trinity

This Sunday, Feb. 10 will be a very important one at Trinity Church, Fall Island, Potsdam when the Rt. Rev. Allen W. Brown, D. D., the Bishop of Albany, will make his annual official visitation to the parish at a service beginning at 9 a.m. This is the only service of the day.

Father Pennock To Institute New Berg Rector

Ogdensburg — St. John's Church, Ogdensburg will be the scene Sunday afternoon, Feb. 10 of a service unique in the American branch of the Anglican Communion.

At this service beginning at 4:30 p.m. the Rev. John R. Ramsey will be instituted as rector of the parish of St. John's, Ogdensburg. The Rev. Canon James W. Pennock, rector of Trinity Church, Potsdam and Dean of St. Lawrence will institute Fr. Ramsey as rector, succeeding the late Canon George A. Palmer.

The Rt. Rev. Allen W. Brown, the Bishop of Albany, will preside at the service, and will preach the sermon. The clergy of St. Lawrence Deanery will be vested and be seated in the sanctuary.

Father Ramsey is well known in the Diocese of Albany, resigning as rector of St. Lukes Church, Catskill, N. Y. to accept the call at Ogdensburg. For several years he has been editor of the Albany Churchman, the official monthly newspaper of the diocese. He is married to the former June Perry and has three children.

A reception will follow the service, and give those attending an opportunity to meet Fr. Ramsey and his family.
