Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Fuller of Edwards will leave tomorrow for India, to spend seven weeks getting acquainted with Indian farmers and their problems.

The St. Lawrence County farm couple will be among a group of four couples and two women representing 10 American farmers, who are state and county leaders of farm organizations and farmer co-operatives. Their visit is sponsored by Farmers and World Affairs, Inc., as part of a five-year exchange to promote friendship and understanding between farmers of the U. S. and India.

## Moulton Notes Civil Service Anniversary

In noting the 80th Anniversary of the Federal Civil Service Act this month, John P. Moulton, Ogdensburg Social Security District Manager has attributed much of the success in the administration of America's social security program to the operation of the civil service system.

"Under civil service, our employees are able to devote their time and energy to doing a good job for social security rather than worrying about how to avoid on to their jobs every time the political climate changes," Moulton stated. "The civil service procedure for hiring new employees through competitive examination assures us of getting the best qualified persons for our jobs."

The basic characteristics of the civil service merit system are: open competitive examination to test the capacity and fitness of applicants; appointments to jobs from among those scoring highest on the tests; and the requirements for serving a probationary period to demonstrate capability before the appointment is made final.

Historians claim that President Garfield's assassination by a disgruntled office-seeker in 1881 aroused public indignation against the "spoils system" and resulted directly in the passage of the Civil Service Act. It was signed into law by President Arthur on Jan. 16, 1883.

The "spoils system" was a cause for much concern to Presidents in the 1890's. When William Henry Harrison took office as President in 1841, almost 40,000 office-seekers swarmed into the Capitol City to claim the 23,700 jobs that made up the Federal executive service of that day. On another occasion, President Lincoln, sick in bed from a smallpox attack, is said to have advised his attendants: Tell all the office-seekers to come in at once, for now I have something I can give to all of them."

In the 80 years since the passage of the Act, coverage has been gradually extended until 91 percent of the executive branch positions in this country are now included under civil service. President Kennedy stated that the Act "has stood the test of time in providing the excellence in civil service which is required for successful execution of Federal programs and policies which have deep significance to all Americans and all citizens of the free world."

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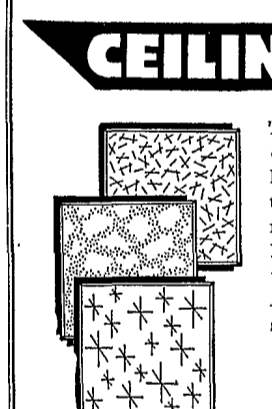
