

## State University Admission Exams Set At Potsdam ATI

The State University College of Potsdam and Canton ATI will be the sites locally of the State University Admissions Examination to be given Saturday, Mar. 9. The exam will be conducted on the campuses of the 32 colleges which are members of the University's uniform admissions program.

The examination is open to students who plan to apply to one of the colleges for the 1963-64 school year, and who did not take the Regents Scholarship Examination in October. Students who took the Regents test will use the mark attained in that examination in applying to one or more of the colleges.

To be eligible for the Mar. 9 examinations, students must have completed application for admission in the mail and post-marked no later than Feb. 18. Application forms and complete instructions may be obtained by writing directly to the Office of Admissions of the college in which the student is interested.

The examination is not required of students who plan to enroll in the State University of Ceramics at Alfred University, the four State University Colleges at Cornell University (Agriculture, Home Economics, Veterinary, and School of Industrial and Labor Relations), and some community colleges.

The admissions examination will also be administered May 4 and July 22, 1963. However, students are urged to submit their applications as early as possible.

Admission to State University colleges is based upon the qualifications of the applicant, and is granted without regard to race, color, creed, or national origin.

### Clarkson NSF Goals Outlined; \$4,550 Granted

The National Science Foundation has granted \$4,550 to Clarkson College for support of a "Cooperative College-School Science Program," under the direction of Robert D. Larsson, professor of mathematics. The N.S.F. grant provides for added administrative and supervisory services for the present high school enrichment program at Clarkson.

The objectives of the Cooperative College-School Science Program, as outlined by the N.S.F. are: "to help identify high-ability secondary school students who have excellent potential for becoming scientists; to accelerate the scholarly development of such students in sciences and mathematics through providing advanced and intensive courses or research participation activity taught and directed by college or university level scientists; to enable selected secondary school teacher participants to assist in the instructional program provided and develop thereby increased capacity to instruct higher level material to talented students; and to help develop cooperation between college and high schools in increasing the quality of education in the sciences."

The N.S.F. has awarded grants of this type throughout the United States. These grants will provide training for 2,389 high ability secondary school students and 689 high school teachers.

Partial Support  
Professor Larsson said the grant to Clarkson will give partial support for transportation of students in the fall and spring of 1963-64, provide for the administration of the program, provide for consultations with schools in regard to the program's effectiveness and the selection of students, and provide for orientation of teachers to the enrichment program. He added that the N.S.F. grant is supplementary to aid received from local boards of education for tuition and cost of supplies for students in the enrichment program.

Last fall, under the Cooperative College-School Science Program, 20 teachers attended a series of ten lectures in mathematics.

Eleven high schools have had students participate in the Clarkson enrichment program since the spring of 1962. There were 51 students from high schools at Norwood-Norfolk, Madrid - Waddington, Brasher

Professor Larsson said he expects another 86 students in mathematics in the fall of 1963 and spring of 1964, and he expects 48 in chemistry in the same period.

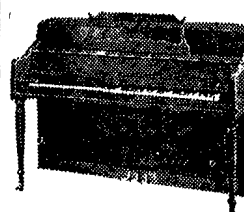

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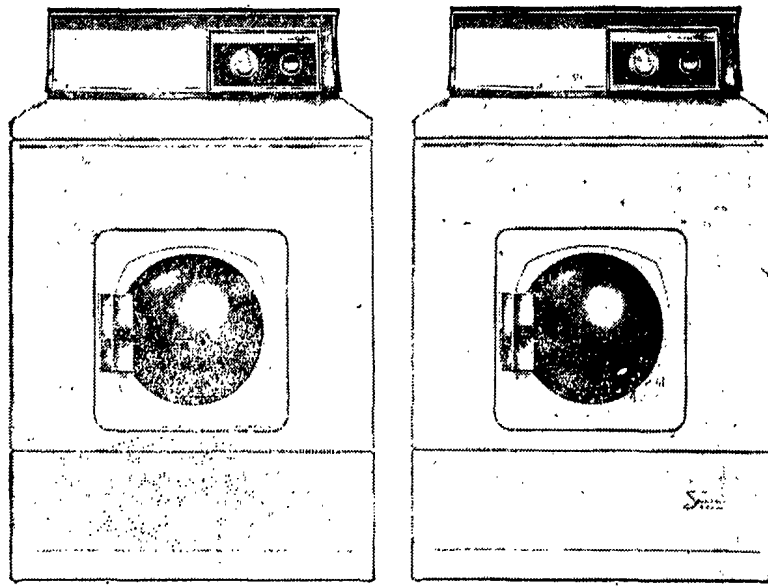
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
