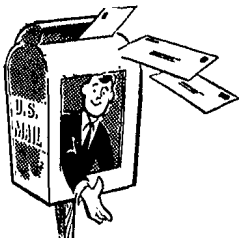

**Workers Over 65 Still Get Benefits**

Many people lose money because they don't check on their social security when they reach retirement age, according to John P. Moulton, Ogdensburg Social Security District manager. In many cases, these people are still working and believe they cannot get any benefit payments unless they are completely retired.

Moulton stated that workers who earn over \$1200 yearly may still get some social security payments depending on the amount of their earnings. He cited as an example, a 65-year-old worker eligible for \$100 a month from social security. In this case, the worker could get some benefits even if his yearly earnings were as high as \$2600.

Funeral services for Frank Russell, 70, Unionville, retired papermaker, were held Friday, Feb. 8 at 9 a.m. in St. Andrew's Church, Norwood. Burial was in Calvary Cemetery.

If a wife or child were eligible for benefits on his account, the worker could earn more than \$2900 and still collect some social security benefits for himself and his family.

Workers age 62 or over, who have not applied for benefits, are urged to check up on their social security status. 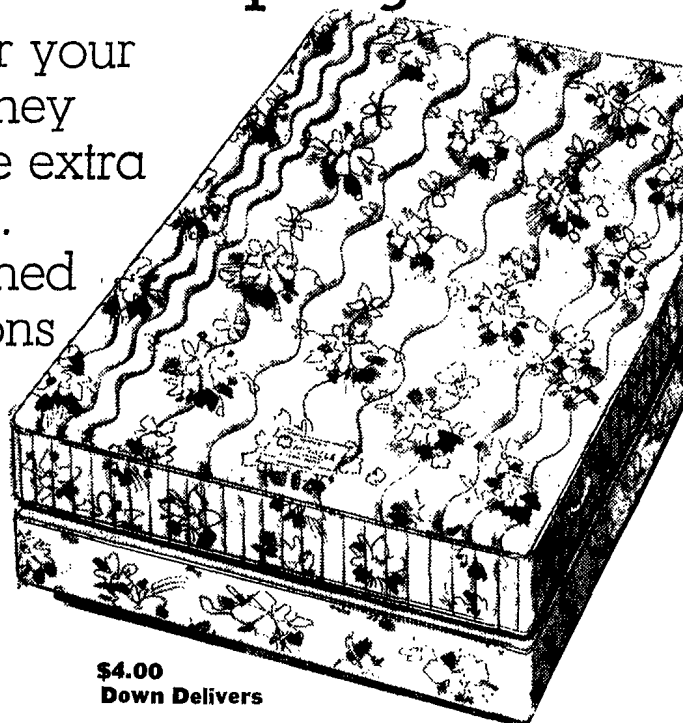
