G.L.F. truck drivers from this area, who completed the year with accident-free records, were presented safe driving awards at a dinner on Tuesday, Feb. 12, at 6:45 p.m. at the Malone Grange Hall, Malone.

"Vocational Education in St. Lawrence County. Present and Future," is the topic to be considered at the February P.T.A. meeting in Potsdam, which will be held at the Senior High School, at 8 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 21. What is currently being done, as well as the greatly enlarged possibilities which could result from the establishment of a special vocational education school in the area, will be presented.

Participating in the meeting will be Miss Melissa Carroll, district superintendent of schools in St. Lawrence County, and executive officer for the Board of Co-operative Educational Services, and James Fugarty, vocational co-ordinator of BOCES. The co-operative board serves Potsdam, Norwood-Norfolk, Parishville-Hopkinton and Colton-Pierrepoint Central Schools. This is also the area which would be served by the proposed new vocational school.

Of special interest will be the presence at the meeting of Assemblyman Vernez Ingram, who has introduced into the State Legislature and is sponsoring the bill which would make possible the proposed new vocational school in this area. Ingram is former P.T.A. President and is noted for his activity in behalf of educational measures.

A short business meeting will precede the discussion, and refreshments will be served at its conclusion. All parents and interested persons are invited to attend and take part in the discussion of this vital and timely topic.

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## NSF Grants Clarkson \$57,000 For 3 Items

The National Science Foundation has awarded Clarkson College of Technology a total of \$57,000 for three projects.

The first is a grant of \$22,300 to support a research project entitled "Bubble Dynamics in Boiling" under the supervision of Professors Robert Cole and H. L. Shulman of Chemical Engineering Department. This project involves a fundamental study of bubble formation, growth, and movement on heated surfaces immersed in liquids.

The work involves taking high speed photographs of the bubbles in a special cell and the subsequent analysis of the bubble dynamics. The grant will support the project for a period of two years.

The second award is a grant of \$8,400 to support an "Undergraduate Science Education Program in Chemical Engineering" under the direction of Dr. Thomas Ward and members of the chemical engineering staff. Four junior chemical engineering students will be chosen this spring to work with the chemical engineering faculty during the coming summer and the following school year.

The students will carry out research work on a variety of projects in conjunction with members of the staff and graduate students already in attendance. The program, which has been supported for the fourth consecutive year by the National Science Foundation, is intended to provide research experience for undergraduates and encourage further study at the graduate level. Approximately three graduates of the students who have been selected for the program have gone on to graduate studies.

The third grant provides \$26,800 for the expansion of graduate research facilities for the Chemical Engineering and Chemistry Departments. The funds which are to be matched by the college will be used for a variety of construction, expansion, and renovation projects in Peyton Hall, chemical engineering building, and the chemistry laboratories of Robert Livingston Clarkson Hall. Five new laboratories, a seminar room and a chemical storage room will be constructed.

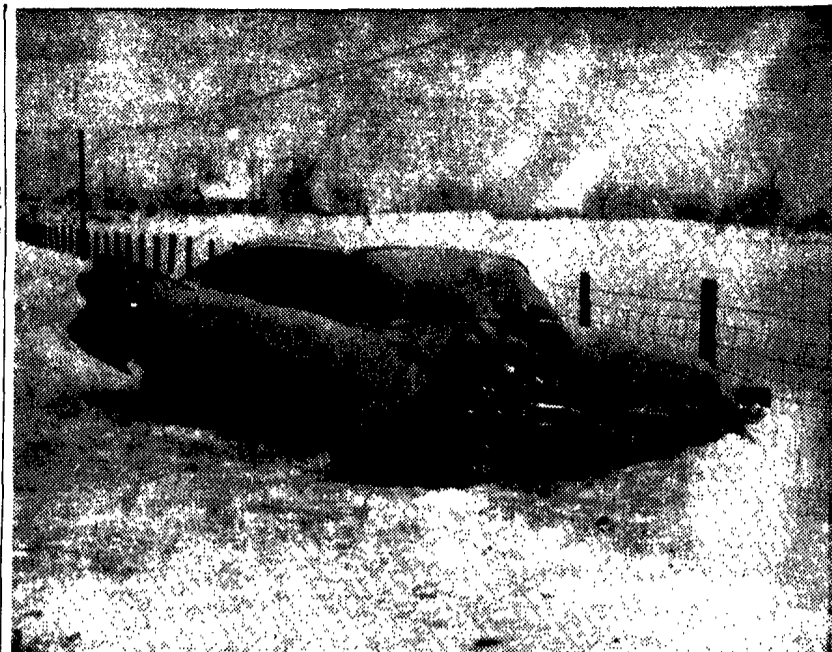
