Frederick Nichols Lasts Rites Held, Retired Railroad Man Dies At 67

Norwood — Funeral services for Frederick B. Nichols, 67, of Norwood, were held Saturday morning, Feb. 9, from St. Andrews Church with the Rev. Msgr. Francis Maguire, pastor, officiating.

Mr. Nichols died last Thursday at Sunmount Veterans Hospital, Tupper Lake, where he had been a patient since July 1962. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Mr. Nichols, a lifelong resident of Norwood, was born in that village on Aug. 11, 1895 and was a son of Herman and Sarah McManus Nichols. He attended Norwood schools and in June of 1921 married the former Azelia Charlebois of Norwood in St. Andrews Church. Mrs. Nichols died about 19 years ago.

Active in community affairs, Mr. Nichols was a member of the Norwood Knights of Columbus Council 2309, the Holy Name Society of St. Andrews Church, the Bishop McEntegret General Assembly Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, and the Clark-Robinson Post American Legion of Norwood. A veteran of World War I, Mr. Nichols retired two years ago from the New York Central Railroad after 40 years of service. He was a switchyard foreman at the time of his retirement.

For a time Mr. Nichols also operated an appliance sales and repair shop from his home on Depot Street.

Surviving are: a son, James Nichols of Norwood; a sister, Miss Madge Nichols, Norwood; and five grandchildren. Burial will be made in Calvary Cemetery, Norwood, in the Spring.

Mrs. Walker, 95, Funeral Service Held Saturday
