Library circulation was 4888 adult books and 2860 children's books, 201 periodicals and three films for a total of 7933. Adult registration was 71, while juvenile registration was 113 for a total of 184. The period of registration is for one year.

During 1962 the library borrowed 1392 books from the North Country Library System and The New York State Library. The library is open afternoons except Sundays and four evenings a week. It is closed Tuesday and Saturday evenings.
