Questions Board
Mrs. Hafer—"Was the original request for a bulldozer for a new or used one?"

Supervisor Healey—"A new one. This was not approved and he was asked to write up new specifications. At the next Board meeting he asked permission to rent one. This was approved at state contract rates."

Mrs. Hafer—"And from what company did he rent the machine from?"

Healey—"Vincent Jerry of Massena."

Mrs. Hafer—"Isn't this the same outfit that handles the Frink snowplow equipment?"

Healey—"Yes it is."

Mrs. Hafer—"Just how much control does the Board have over the Superintendent of Highways?"

Healey—"We control his purse strings. The Board can over rule him and buy something he does not approve of, but we can't make him use it. We found that out once before."

Put to Vote
The resolution first made by Krebs to have Fountain present specifications to the Board before advertising for bidders was then put to a vote.

The motion was defeated 3-2 with Healey and Krebs the sole voters in favor of it. Halliday, Councilmen Haggett and Evans voted against the motion. Justice Daily was not present at the meeting.

Supervisor Healey then asked about Fountain's request at the last Board meeting to advertise for a used bulldozer. Halliday said that the Board will ask Fountain to be present at the next meeting, and it would be discussed.

Healey then said, "If we end up buying the bulldozer that Fountain has been using all summer we should be allowed to deduct the \$8,000 we have spent in rental from the purchase price."

Halliday and Krebs both agreed that this should be stipulated in the advertisement for bidders.

Planning Commission
Krebs then changed the temper of the meeting by announcing the appointment of two new members to the Planning Commission. He said that David Garner and Richard Sanford have agreed to serve, and that an organizational meeting will be held within a month.

Justice Krebs also moved to establish a joint recreation commission between the town and the villages within the town for the purpose of providing coordination with all the various forms of recreation provided the youth of the town. Among them are swimming programs, playground use, sports and others.

Bradshaw Speaks
Krebs asked that R. Gerald Bradshaw, Mrs. Frances Sampson and Richard Van Dusen be appointed to the commission. In accepting his post, Bradshaw stated, "there is a great deal to be done for the youth of this area if all programs are coordinated with the commission. Our main problem is that some kids are getting too much attention while others are getting none... and the ones that are getting the least need it the most."

Vitamin C Is Needed For Good Health Now

Even though the recent freeze in Florida has caused the price of orange juice and other citrus products to rise, citrus fruit is still an inexpensive source of Vitamin C. This is particularly true of orange and grapefruit juice, either canned or frozen concentrated.

Citrus fruits are one of the best food sources of Vitamin C (ascorbic acid). Vitamin C is needed to make the cementing substances that hold body cells together. It also helps in absorption of iron. Since Vitamin C is not stored in the body, it must be part of the daily food intake.

Other good sources of Vitamin C besides citrus fruits are green peppers, broccoli, brussels sprouts, spinach, cabbage, raw greens, sweet potatoes, strawberries, cantaloupe, and white potatoes, newly harvested.

half of all fire calls are made to this area.

The master planner will take past figures on fire calls there, compare them with the growth of population in that area, determine what kind of buildings are going to be built there and compare this to the need the area may have for a fire company.

If after doing all this, he finds that a fire company is needed to serve only this specific area... then he will include it in the master plan as one of the projected needs of the village.

"For the People"
This is only one example, there are hundreds which work much the same way. "Planning is for the people," says Mathiasen, and that is what he will attempt to do.

In the master plan there will be a capital improvements budget which will show how much money is going to be needed in the next 10 or 20 years for capital improvements, how much is now being spent, what areas it will be needed in and how to deploy the funds to fit the need.

A good example of this would be, hypothetically, the village may spend \$25,000 a year on street repair. The master plan may show that only \$15,000 is badly needed. The plan would call for saving the remaining \$10,000 to use in another area badly in need of funds.

Mathiasen will also do a traffic analysis to determine the future situation in that area. He will try to find out if there is an over-burden of traffic on village streets and what could be done to cure it.

Other Areas
He will also take figures on master plans from other areas and report on how they compare with Potsdam, the county, state and nation.

Mathiasen is a native of New Jersey. He received his bachelor of arts degree in sociology and economics from Drew University in Madison, N.J., and his masters degree in planning from New York University.

He lived on Long Island for several years where he was engaged with a firm of planning consultants to do master planning for the city of Long Beach. He will reside in Potsdam on Leroy Street with his wife and two children during the duration of his attachment to "Program 701."
