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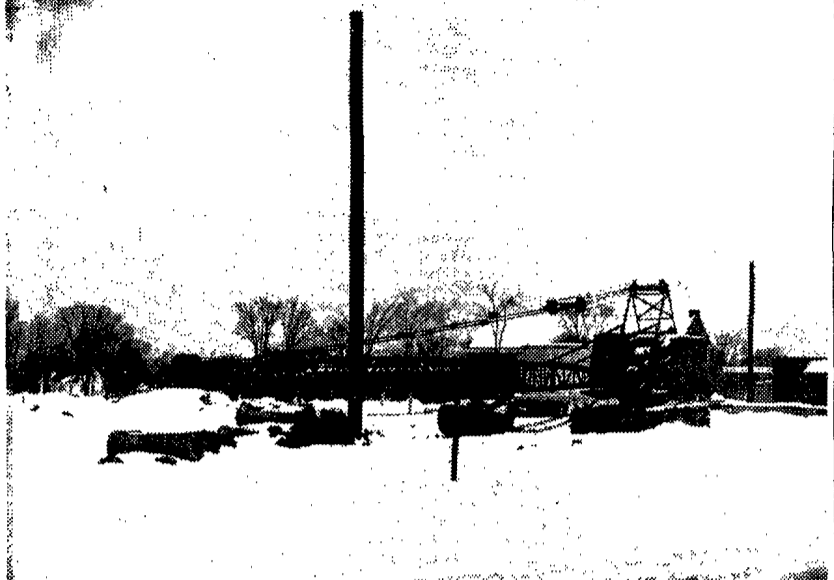

1962 Brings Increased Interest In Scouting

The year 1962 saw a change in the fortunes of the St. Lawrence Council, Boy Scouts of America, according to Council President, Willard M. Longshore, in his report for 1962.

Active membership recorded for the end of December 1962 was 2100 boys, the first time in four years that a gain in membership had been noted. Actually, during the year over 3,000 boys took part in the three phases of the Boy Scouts of America in its Cubbing, Boy Scouting, and Exploring programs. This apparent disparagement between figures is explained by some Cubs not yet registered as Boy Scouts as they turned 11 years of age and left Cubbing, some Boy Scouts not registering as Explorers when able at 14 years of age, and the natural attrition of those Explorers becoming 18 years of age and no longer being counted as boys.

Also this past year, despite several units sponsored by various institutions, going out of existence, many units gained in overall membership, most boys did transfer to active units and a gain of over 3 1/2 percent in memberships was realized. There are currently 23 Cub Packs, 42 Boy Scout Troops and 13 Explorer units.

These gains were accomplished due to several reasons, not the least being an increased allotment from the United Fund. This insured keeping a third professional man on the job throughout the year, and this in turn resulted in more frequent visits and better service to sponsors, to units and leaders, more training accomplished, more continuity to the program, and consequently better unit programs with more interested boys taking part.

A most important fiscal matter was the continued year-round operation remaining within the limits of the budget and closing the year just in the black side of the ledger. This is probably considered to be a bit harder than normal, since the product of the St. Lawrence Council is that mystic unknown developing today's boys to be tomorrow's men, and from this there is no immediate profit to off-set expenditures.

53 Sponsors An interesting facet is the number of institutions that have adopted the programs of Cubbing, Boy Scouting, or Exploring and use it to supplement or actually provide the basis of their respective constitutional directed youth activities. This numbers 53 different groups operating the 77 units of the council.

Titles of these sponsors in the St. Lawrence Council are as varied as the many people involved which is an indication of the American spirit. These are: Baptist Church, Congregational Church, Episcopal Church, Methodist Church, Presbyterian Church, Roman Catholic Church, American Legion, Board of Education, CIO-AFL Union, Group of Citizens, Kiwanis Club, Knights of Columbus, Lions Club, Masonic Lodge, Odd Fellows Lodge, Parent Teachers Association, Rotary Club, Sportsman Club, and Volunteer Fire Company.

The year 1962 was also the year of definite increases: Five percent more troops spent more nights out camping — actually 24 of 42 Troops earned the National Camping Award;

110 different boys attended summer Camp at Camp Vigor, 64 more than the year before; four District Camporees were conducted with 1103 participants; 148 more ranks were earned by Cubs, Boy Scouts and Explorers for a total of 1074; 28 young men earned the Eagle Rank which was a jump of 16 over the previous year. Nearly the same total number of Merit Badges were earned: 1370 in 1961 and 1378 in 1962, but with a considerable increase in the "required" badges with results evidenced by the new crop of Eagle Scouts.
