

# Bowhall, Clark, Murray Will Lead Republican Slate In March Elections

Norwood — Rodney Murray, well known resident of this village, was made the second Republican choice for trusteeship candidate in the village elections next month at the GOP caucus Monday night.

Murray replaces present Trustee Larry Gravelle who declined to be a candidate for re-election. Gravelle cited pressing business needs as reasons for withdrawing from the race.

The nomination of Murray was made by GOP Chairman Gerald Dockum and was carried unanimously by the Republican electors present.

The candidacy of Mayor and the other Trustee were filled by Mayor Roscoe Bowhall and

Trustee Hubert Clark to succeed themselves. Mrs. Alice Wright nominated Bowhall and Larry Gravelle made the nomination for Clark.

Earl K. Drew was chairman of the caucus and Arthur Tebo was secretary.

The candidates said that a platform had not yet been formed for the campaign and that it would be discussed at a meeting of the village committee next Tuesday.

A startling development came up at the caucus with the resignation of Gerald Dockum as committee chairman. He said that he was very gratified with the cooperation he had received in the past by all GOP public officials, but he would not again be chairman of the committee.

At a meeting of the committee following the caucus Ray Hepfner was elected chairman and Mrs. Wright was re-elected vice-chairman.

The candidacy of Murray was well concealed prior to the caucus. Murray is a native of Norwood and has been active in civic affairs for many years.

He is past secretary of the Norwood Kiwanis and presently holds the office of Kiwanis vice-president. He is a past chief of the Norwood Fire Department and has been an active member of various area bowling leagues as well as an officer of several leagues.

Both Bowhall and Clark are well known in and around Norwood and have held public office several times in the past.

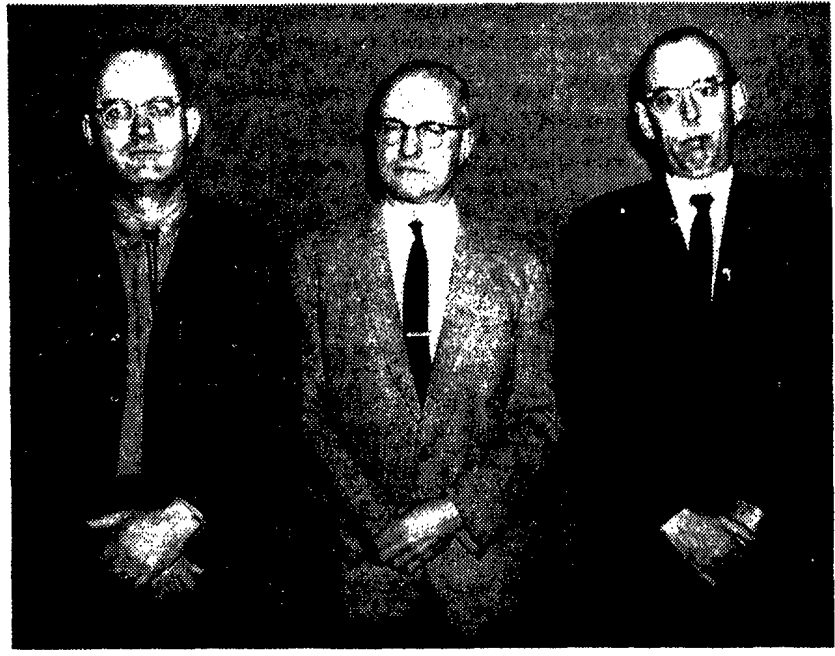

## Funeral Service Held Monday For Maurice Quigley; School Custodian

Norwood — Funeral services for Maurice A. Quigley, 59, 18 River St., Norwood, were held at 9 a.m. Monday from St. Andrews Church with the Rev. Msgr. Francis Maquire, pastor, officiating. Burial was made in Calvary Cemetery.

Mr. Quigley died very suddenly Friday morning around noon at his home as he was about to eat lunch. Death was attributed to a heart attack caused by over exertion. He had been shoveling snow that morning at the St. Andrews School and church.

Mr. Quigley was born Apr. 4, 1903 in the town of Potsdam to the late James and Ella Arnie Quigley. He attended Madrid schools and on June 21, 1927 he married the former Delilah Penny in Norwood.

He had been a salesman for the H.M. Kinsman Co. of Norwood for over 35 years until the company closed a few years ago. After leaving the Kinsman group he became custodian of the Catholic church and its parochial school in September 1962.

Surviving are: his wife, Delilah; two daughters, Mrs. Lewis (Elinor) Michaels of Rochester and Mrs. Norman (Evelyn) LaMotte, Syracuse; two sons, Charles, now in Anchorage, Alaska with the United States Air Force, and Richard Quigley, at home; 13 grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Francis (Iustine) Hughes of Rochester and Mrs. Alice Blanchard of Louisville.

Mr. Quigley was a member of St. Andrews Church and its Holy Name Society. Funeral arrangements were made by the Buck Funeral Home.

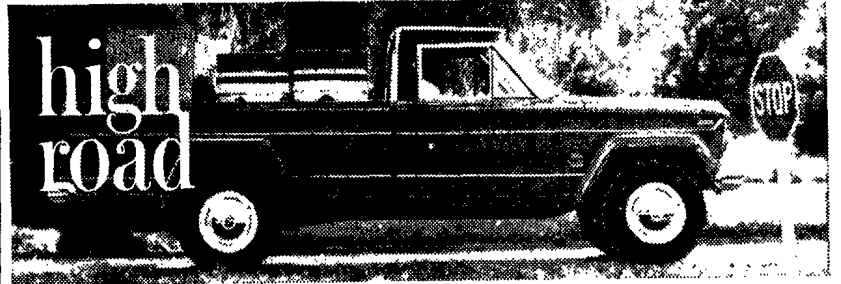
