Until June 1963, the Sykes family were stationed in just about every part of the world. At that time, they settled in Canastota where Major Sykes was retired from military service in November 1963. Surviving are her husband, a son Ronald, a daughter Debra Ann, her parents, and Mrs. Carl Tracy, West Stockholm; a sister, Mrs. Harold (Doris) Kelly, Potsdam; a brother, Warren Tracy, West Stockholm.

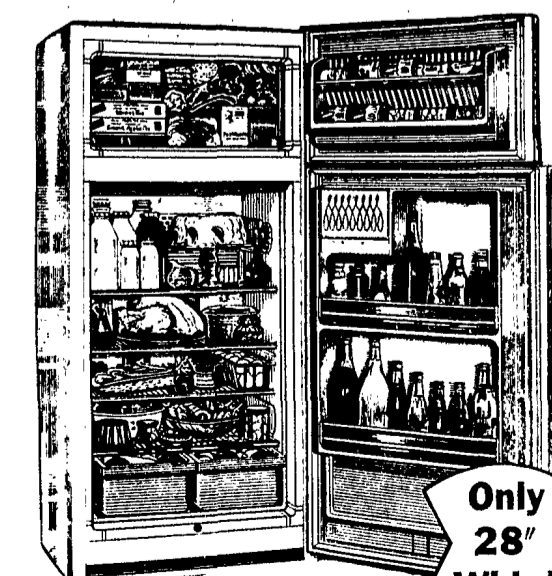

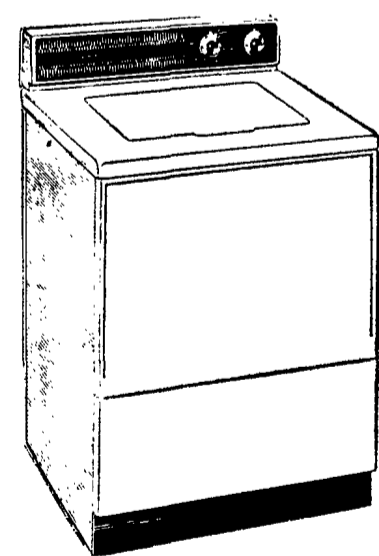

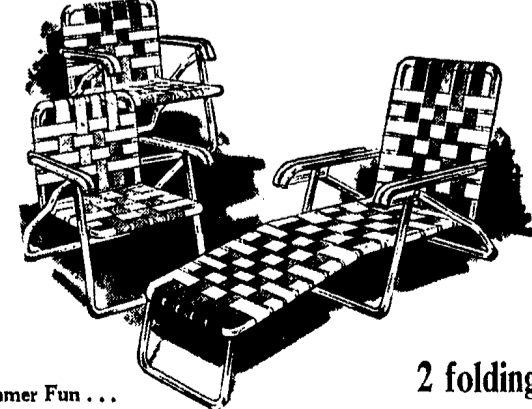
