Dr. Charles Lahey of The State University College at Potsdam is giving a paper, "The Discovery Approach to the Teaching of Social Stud-

ies," at a conference to be held by UNESCO and the New York State Education Department, Apr. 22-24 at Dobbs Ferry.

Topic of the conference will be "Challenge and Response—American Education in a Revolutionary World." Dr. Lahey has pioneered in

the "discovery approach" method of teaching. In 1953-54 he inaugurated this method in a New York State history course at The State University College, and since 1958 he and Prof. Robert Arnold have developed similar programs for use in public schools.

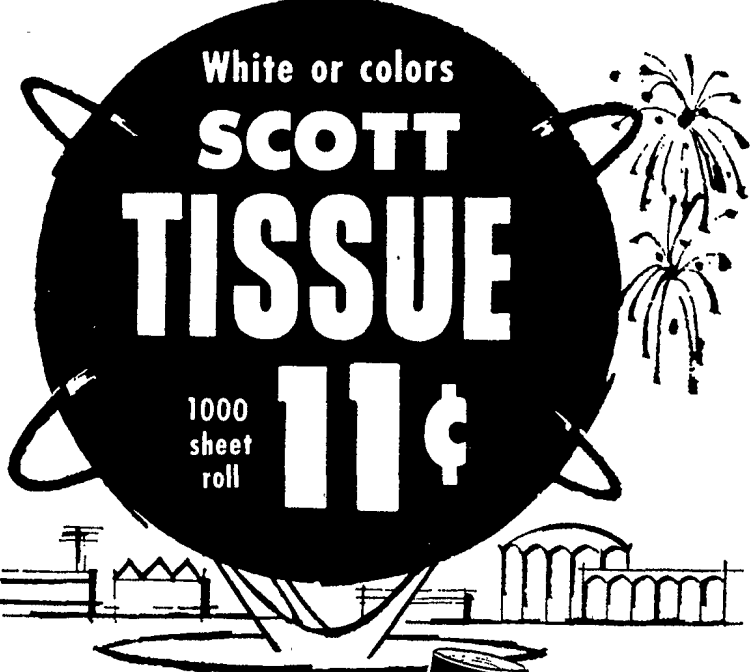
