Employers Note This Date—Apr. 30

Area employers are reminded that April 30, is an important tax date. District Director of Internal Revenue John E. Foley said it is the deadline for reporting and paying income tax withheld and social security taxes for the calendar quarter ended Mar. 31, 1964.

Foley said employers should use Form 941 to report their tax liability for that period, and mail it along with depositary receipts and full payment of taxes due, to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 34 West Mohawk Street, Buffalo 2, N. Y.

Foley said taxpayers who made full and timely deposits in local authorized banks, or Federal Reserve Banks, of the taxes due, have until May 11, 1964 to file their returns. Circular E, "Employer's Tax Guide," which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.
