**Utica Concert Will Feature College Chorus**

Crane Collegiate Singers of The State University College at Potsdam will sing Bach's "Magnificat" with the Utica Symphony Orchestra on Tuesday, Apr. 28.

The performance will be conducted by Joseph Henry in the auditorium of Proctor High School.

Beethoven's "Fifth Symphony" also will be performed during the concert, which will be part of the symphony's regular subscription series.

Richard Griffith, of the Crane department faculty of The State University College, will be a soloist, with Alan Adams, a 1961 graduate of the college's Crane department.

Crane Collegiate Singers is a 55 voice mixed chorus of music students conducted by Brock McElheran. The group received wide recognition

when it performed in the American premiere of Karlheinz Stockhausen's "Memento," conducted by the composer in Buffalo recently.

**Milk Official Scores League Plant Closings**

James Speer, president of the Board of Directors of Eastern Milk Producers, stated at a talk given before 250 members and families in Homer on Apr. 16. "I am appalled at the Dairyman's League official, Russell Dennis, who urged unity of cooperatives in one breath and disunity in another breath, while talking to producers at Lockport, recently," Speer warned that, "those who live in glass houses should not throw stones."

In this connection Speer referred to the fact that the Dairyman's League was among those who closed 50 plants last year concerning which Dennis made reference, and, moreover, "the Dairyman's League cannot and has not guaranteed producers markets for their milk while assuring them the blend price under the order."

Eastern Milk Producers Cooperative has assured its members in the New York pool that they have guaranteed outlets for their milk and will receive the blend price under the order for the ensuing year. This guarantee was not supported or agreed upon by the League at a recent series of meetings of the cooperative groups.

Speer said, "if Eastern Milk Producers received the amount of cooperative moneys that the Dairyman's League has received since the origin of the New York Federal Order, and in addition deducted the amount of money that the League members have deducted from their milk checks, I am sure that a manufacturing plant could be built in every county in the New York milkshed."

He further stated, "however this is a fluid milk market area and we intend to keep it that way. Those who are establishing surplus manufacturing milk plants will inevitably fail."

He also has starred on various network shows and on many television stations as a special guest attraction in such far away places as Sidney, Nova Scotia, St. Johns, Newfoundland; and scores more in the United States.

Among the many outstanding features with this folk concert and western musical show are Chickie Williams, lovely singer of folk ballads whose recording of "Beyond the Sunset" catapulted her to a top spot among girl vocalists. Marion Martin, noted blind accordionist and Fred Johnson on fiddle.
