**Deadline Now For Excise Tax**

District Director of Internal Revenue, John E. Foley, reminded manufacturers, retailers, and other taxpayers required to file quarterly Federal excise tax returns that today is the deadline for filing returns and paying the tax for the calendar quarter ending Mar. 31, 1964.

Foley said taxpayers liable for more than \$100 of the excise taxes listed on Form 720 for any month (except the third of a quarter), are required to deposit their full payments of these taxes in local authorized banks or a Federal Reserve Bank before the last day of the month after the month in which the tax liability occurred. The taxes for the third month of the first quarter of 1964 may be voluntarily deposited by today.

Timely deposits of taxes due for the first quarter of the year have until May 11, 1964 to file their Forms 720, and he added that validated Federal Depository Receipts, Forms 537, must be submitted with the Form 720.

**Charles Smith In Summer Math Institute**

Charles L. Smith, Route 2, Potsdam, is among 80 teachers who have been appointed to participate in a summer institute in mathematics, June 15-Sept. 5, at University of Illinois.

Sponsored by the National Science Foundation, the institute is for teachers of college mathematics. A proposed sequence of four summer institutes leads to the degree of master of arts in mathematics. Appointments are only for this period because NSF funds are appropriated on a yearly basis. The NSF summer institute director, explained that the institute program objectives are to increase the participant's knowledge of subject matter both with regard to breadth and depth and to contribute to the improvement of teacher training programs of teacher training institutions. He said the philosophy of the institute is that the first prerequisite for good teaching in mathematics is depth of knowledge of mathematics.
