Eddie Colbert Condition Good

Two Norwood men fortunately escaped serious injury when they were involved in an unusual accident Sunday afternoon. Eddie Colbert, 31 and Jerry Laramay, 32, both of Route 1, were overcome with carbon monoxide fumes released from a gasoline pump they were using to clean out a well.

The incident occurred on a farm lot about one-half mile off the Norwood-Burnhams Corners Road. According to the report issued by Sheriff Ceylon Allen and Deputy Harry Ayers, Colbert was planning to build a house on the lot, which he owns, and had gone to the site with Laramay to pump out the well.

The men placed the gasoline pump in the 20-foot well, pumped the water out, leaving only mud and sludge in the bottom, and then left for a few hours to give the fumes time to escape.

When they returned later in the day, accompanied by Miss Janet Woods, Colbert descended the ladder to the foot of the well and suddenly became dizzy. He attempted to climb back out, but lost consciousness near the top of the ladder, falling back to the bottom of the well, 20 feet below.

Laramay grabbed a rope, descended the well and placed the rope around Colbert's body. At that point, he too began to feel dizzy, but he managed to give his friend mouth-to-mouth resuscitation before he climbed back to the top for air.

Meanwhile, Miss Woods had gone for help. But Laramay had managed to pull Colbert out of the well by means of the rope before Miss Woods returned with the Norfolk Rescue Squad.

When the Squad arrived, after a seven-mile run, they administered first aid and oxygen to both men before and during the trip to Potsdam Hospital, where Laramay was treated and released. Colbert was kept in the hospital for a few days, where he has been under the care of Dr. Henry Vinicor of Norwood. His condition was listed by the hospital as good late Tuesday.


