John Osier Proves Oratorical Ability; Is Nihanawate DAR Choice

John Osier, son of Mrs. Myrtle Osier, 12½ Francis St., Potsdam, has been selected by Nihanawate Chapter DAR as its candidate for the 1964 New York State DAR Scholarship, to be awarded this June.

Nihanawate Chapter chose Osier from applicants from seven schools in eastern St. Lawrence County. Other chapters throughout the State are in the process of submitting other candidates, one of whom will be selected as the scholarship recipient.

The DAR scholarship is new this year and replaces the DAR Student Loan Fund, it will be awarded annually.

Osier, who is president of the Student Council at Potsdam High School, stands number six in a class of 139 students. He has also been very active in athletics, having earned letters in football and basketball.

At the Sunday contest, where young Osier was aiming toward competition in the State contest and a possible college scholarship, he delivered a 45-minute speech on "The Ecumenical Movement... It's Impact on the World."

N. Y. Telephone Begins New Billing Process

According to John J. Hayes, manager, telephone customers in the Potsdam, Canton, Norfolk, Madrid and Waddington exchanges will have a new type bill when they receive their next regular monthly statement.

This new statement is a part of a new accounting system which enables us to take advantage of computers and other high speed accounting equipment for the mechanization of posting payments to customers' accounts.

Enclosed with the new type statement will be a punched card to be returned when the customer pays his bill. The card replaces the stub which was attached to the old type bill.

"The card enclosed with the new statement is an important part of the new system", Hayes said. He asks that each customer remembers to bring the card when paying his bill at the office or to include it in the return envelope when paying by mail.
