

Fred Woodruff, Former Banker, Services Held

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon for Frederick C. Woodruff, 76, well-known Potsdam banker, who died April 30 at the Potsdam Hospital.

The Rev. William A. Caldwell, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated at the services held at 2 p.m. Monday at Garner Funeral Home. Burial was in Bayside cemetery.

Bearers were: Phil Shelly, Clarence Premo, Delbert Kingston, Dan Sheets, Harry Van Ness and Dr. Robert Collins, John Van Ness and William L. Wee.

Mr. Woodruff was taken ill unexpectedly at his home at 16 Clark Drive on Thursday and was taken to the Potsdam Hospital.

A native of Duane, N. Y., Mr. Woodruff was born July 16, 1887, the son of Richard and Ida Hoose Woodruff. He first came to Potsdam in 1905 when he attended the Potsdam Normal School. During his student days he was active in athletics, starring especially in football. Upon graduation from the Normal School, he accepted a position as an instructor and athletic coach in a private school in Washington, D. C.

In 1910 he returned to Potsdam and joined the People's Bank of Potsdam, when Carleton Sanford was president, thus beginning his 54 active years in banking here. He started as bookkeeper, then became cashier in 1916. In 1923 upon the death of Herbert J. Sanford, he was named president of the People's Bank. At that time he was one of the "youngest bank presidents in the state."

Mr. Woodruff was president of the People's Bank for 21 years and when it was merged with the Citizens National Bank, he became president of the new bank, the Potsdam Bank and Trust Company. He served as its president for nine years, until his retirement in December, 1963.

The Potsdam Savings and Loan also had the benefit of Mr. Woodruff's banking experience. He was named to the board of this institution in 1915 and began his 49th year on the board this January. He served as treasurer for over 25 years and as president from 1959 to 1960.

Active in Community
During the years he was active in community affairs, especially those associated with community betterment. He was treasurer of the Potsdam branch of the American Red Cross for more than 25 years and was one of the original trustees of the Potsdam Hospital. He was a former chairman of the board of trustees of the First Methodist Church.

In addition, he was a past president of the St. Lawrence County Banking Association and a former director of the Rotary Club. He was active in the Racket River Lodge, F and

A.M. Knights' Temple, O.E.S., the Potsdam Club, and a director of the former Potsdam Boys Club.

Mr. Woodruff and Miss Gladys McCaig of Shamokin, Pa. were married in 1925. She was a graduate of the Crane Institute of Music.

Survivors include his wife; a son, David Woodruff, Buffalo; two sisters, Mrs. Edith O'Sullivan, Los Gatos, Calif., and Mrs. Barbara Freeman, Laguna Beach, Calif. A son, Frederick W. Woodruff, Jr., died in 1958.
