Chauffeurs Must Renew Licenses

Renewal applications for New York State licensed chauffeurs will be mailed by the Department of Motor Vehicles today.

Approximately 150,000 of the applications will go out to drivers whose licenses expire on Sunday, May 31, and who are eligible to renew. Eligible are those whose licenses are not under suspension or revocation.

Through the Department's data processing system, the ineligible are eliminated and do not receive the renewal punch cards until their penalties have been satisfied.

Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hulst reminds all applicants that the renewals themselves are not licenses until the cards have been completely filled out and the fee of \$6 paid at the newest

motor vehicle office. Renewal chauffeurs may accomplish this by mail, making certain to write in all the requested data, signing the form and enclosing the proper fee and renewal stub from their present licenses.
