Stockholm Man To Attend Case Summer Program

Gilbert Goodgion, assistant professor, Clarkson College and a resident of West Stockholm, has been selected to participate in Case Institute of Technology's twelfth annual Economics in Action summer program this year. The program, conducted for 45 college teachers of economics, management and related subjects, will be held from June 20 to July 18.

The four-week fellowship program is sponsored by Republic Steel Corporation and is under the direction of Dr. Samuel J. Mantel, Jr., associate professor of economics at Case, and Dr. Gerhard Rosenger, Case assistant professor of economics.

Objectives of the program are to provide an opportunity for the teachers to analyze, together with outstanding business executives, problems of management decision-making, and to study topics of current interest to the profession under the leadership of outstanding economists. Further goals are the development of a greater familiarity with the complexities of operating business systems, and the exchange of ideas among educators representing a wide range of institutions and interests.

The program will consist of lectures on current problems by four leading economists, conferences with leading businessmen visits to industrial plants and informal discussions. During their stay at
